#### WILL CARLETON'S TALKS.

SOME VIEWS IN THE QUEEN CITY OF THE EMPIRE STATE.

Its Historic Spots-The Albany of Two Hundred Years Ago - Aaron Burr's Home-Where Bret Harte was Born-John G. Saxe-A Gigantic Castle on the Hudson.

(Copyrighted, 1887, by Will Carleton.) ALBANY, N.Y., Oct. 19, -This capital among the hills is as bright as ever to-day, and to the tourist one of the most interesting cities on our continent. As queen of the Northern Hudson it has a splendid throne of green hills and fire-stained autumn leaves, with lofty though distant mountains always in sight. As one of the cradles of that lusty baby of the eighteenth century, our Nation, it stands distinguished in that it is almost the oldest and best. It began to make history centuries ago and is still engaged in the process. As a commercial city it is not to be forgotten, and has probably a population of a clean-cut hundred thousand. As a political centre and headquarters of the pivotal state, it is almost junior Washington, D.C. Indeed, Garfield used to say that Albany was the first capital of the United States, on account of the congress of commissioners that met here in 1754, and arranged for a plan of union between the colonies, which afterward grew into the present grand confederation.

It has been a city for two hundred years, and the terms of its original charter made it a mile wide by sixteen miles long. There is no telling how many people have bought building lots which they supposed to be rightin the heart of the town, and who afterwards discovered to their sorrow that their possessions were a couple of hours' drive from the post-office. The western city-lot swindles are only a repetition of history and serve to show that there is nothing particularly new; and many people to-day own "Albany lots" which will never be in sight of any city buildings.

But those who possess property in the real city of Albany do not find any fault with the fact, and those who walk about and feel that they own the whole of it by virtue of having read its eventful history know that they have a very goodly estate. Let us walk the streets a little while to day, and find how much of it belongs to us.

Here, on the corner of State and James streets, is the ground, well hidden by a thrifty money bank, upon which stood the home of that excellent but long-deceased lady, whose ghost holds a Fortunatus purse that never seemed to get quite open, Anneke Jans. For many years along series of enthusiastic heirs have kept alive the memory of this good lady and insisted that she was wealthy. This they have said as touching the assertion that a large portion of the property of Trinity church, in New York, belongs to them. They have not as yet convinced the courts of it, and probably never will, but they always feel a little richer when talking the matter over, and help to make this spot more valuable to the tourist. The people who own the property have thought enough of the rights of history to cut an antique looking inscription in the building with the statement that she used to reside here, and they are to be thanked for doing so. Our history ought to be printed not only in books but in granite, brass, and marble, and in such places as he who walks may read.

Here are the boundaries of old Albany, as it existed just two hundred years ago, when it was a walled town. Like London it had a wall-surrounded nucleus, a city within a city. But the walls were of wood, and have long ago, with their six strong gates, been sacrificed to the gods of change and destruction. Still, we know the bounderies of the old town, and can follow them through Pearl, Beaver, and Steuben streets.

From this starting-place we wander about the quaint old and new city, and find many places, old and new, to dream over. Here is where lived for many years Aaron Burr, homely and fascinating, warm-hearted and cruel, a legislator and a murderer, a statesman and a traitor, the most brilliant bundle of inconsistencies that this country ever possessed. We pass several old mansions intensely interesting to those who are descend-

ed from their former occupants. Here is the place where Bret Harte was born, who afterwards went west and sung notes upon his California flute that made the world listen for a time. This is where Alfred B. Street lived. He wrote some poems that the school-reader compilers used to use to brighten up their books with. have seen one of his spirited effusions wake up a whole reading class in the old district school on a cold winter's day. Here is a place with an indescribable sad feel- where John G. Saxe died. Poor Saxe! Possessed of a merry lyrical genius that made the world laugh, with a good feeling at its heart every time he put pen to paper, as jolly a picture of health and spirits as ever walked the lecture-platform where my boy eyes once gazed greedily upon him. One calamity after another tumbled atop of him, cold avalanches of sorrow and pain; he sank into the mists of melancholy and was years in dying. Thank God that he is out of it

all, and where he can go on again! But here we climb, propelled by a gallant four-horse team drawing the poor man's carriage, a street-car, up State street, to the top of the hill west of Hudson river, where the old fort used to be. Here is the people's palace. A state-house which will some day ald new fame to this city and commonwealth. Like a cathedral it is long in building, but it can afford to wait until twenty millions of dollars have been expend ed upon it. It was planned almost a quarter of a century ago, and has already outlived many of those who have had to do with it, and for the last two years it has waited quietly for some more money to en-


able it to go on with its growth. The outside, although huge and massive, is not yet imposing, for it still lacks the grand dome which will give it a countenance and an individuality. The nearly square shape of this great structure is a standing rebuke to our Capitol at Washington, which is a series of architectural after-thoughts, too long strung out to produce any symmetrical effect, and constantly reminds one of a railroad train with the locomotive in the centre. All kinds of architecture are represented in this State house, for the nineteenth century has no architecture of its own, except that of its own fortunes, and pilfers, sometimes indiscriminately, from all the past ages. One is hopelessly puzzled in trying to find of what "order" anything is that is built nowadays. The American individuality of the structure appears in the inside carvings. Some of these are ingenious, and have thought behind them; much of them, of course, are mearly an imitation of something else. But occasionally in this work I see, or fancy that I see, the foreshadow of a distinctive American art, that shall tear loose from the old traditions and speak its own thoughts. Straws shows which way the wind blows; and in some of the oak carvings of Yankee faces, displaying different moods of grief,

hilarity and terror, there is more originality than in all the building's splendor. The grandeurs of this gigantic castle upon the Hudson need a book for their description. The corridors, the staircases, the




