

CHEESE MARKETS.

GANANOQUE, Oct. 24. - The cheese board has concluded its meetings for the year. It was composed of the representatives of twelve factories. The number of boxes registered up to date of this meeting was 6,598; number estimated as yet to be made, 3,220, making a total of 9,818 for the season. These would average 60lbs, each, or 588,080 lbs., and at 10 cts. a pound would amount to \$58,808, nearly \$5,000 for each of the twelve factories. The treasurer has - a small surplus.

INTER-PROVINCIAL CONFERENCE.

ecrecy of Proceedings Carefully Main-

tained... Some Talk About It.

It is learned the probabilities are that the subsidy question will be one of the first discussed, and that an agreement will be come to favoring a basis of \$1 a head according to population as determined by every decennial census. The abolition of the federal veto powers will, it is said, be strongly pressed by Mr. Norquay, supported by his colleagues of the other provinces, who favor submitting to the Supreme court any legislation which might be considered by the fed eral government as unconstitutional. Regarding the appointment of judges it will probably be decided to endeavor to limit the appointing power of the federal govern-ment to a list of benchers previously elect-

ed by the bars of each province. The provincial bounderies will probably be definitely revised so as to leave no doubt as to the limits of their territorial jurisdiction. The premier of Quebec will claim all that immense territory lying north to Hudson Bay from Labrador to the Ottawa, which strictly belongs to this province, although claimed so far by the Federal government as the North East Territory.

The representation of the provinces in the senate will also be discussed, the appointment of senators being left to the legislature or government of each province, or some other mode of nominating senators being devised, so as to secure a fair provincial representation in that most important house.

The fact that the premier of Prince Ed ward Island has failed to answer Mr. Mercier's invitation to send a delegate to the conference is causing much comment. "This is not to be wondered at," said Mr. Fielding "the Island people don't care to come forward in such an important matter as that which brings us to Quebec, but if any good should come out of the conference you will then hear them clamor for their share.

#### THE CHATSWORH DISASTER.

The Railway Company Settles a Portion of the Various Claims Against It.

GALESBURG, Ill., Oct. 22. - The attorney representing the Toledo, Peoria and Western railroad was here yesterday and ar ranged for paying the following amounts as settlements in full for deaths and injuries occurring at the Chatsworth wreck to Knox county people: To Mrs. W. M. Truvillo, Abingdon, husband killed, \$2,000; to Rev. Mr. Snedaker, Abingdon, death of wife, \$1,400; injury to son, \$2,600; to J. H Armstrong, Abingdon, loss of eye, \$500; to Mrs. Sydney Smith, Galesburg, injury to back, \$1,175. The following adjustments have been practically agreed upon: To Mrs. W. M. Collins, husband hilled, \$2,000; to Mrs. H. H. Van Liew, husband killed, \$2,000. Minor claims of W. C. Parker and Mrs. Walter Gucker were settled. An offer of \$650 to Mrs. C. Allen, injured in the wreck, was refused. The attorney in the cases settled here gave drafts that were promptly honored.

#### A MARITIME MYSTERY.

A Farmer Found Dead on an Unfrequented Road-Shot in the Back.

HALIFAX, N.S., Oct. 24. - Peter Doyle, of Lower Masquodobolt, went on a fishing excursion and was found dead at the side of an unfrequented road. He had been shot in the back. His gun was lying a short distance ahead of the body, and the weapor and wound showed that the man had no shot himself. The whole affair is shrouded in mystery.

### Lecture on Monday Evening.

The knights of labor have secured Mr. F. M. Fogg, the distinguished lecturer, to deliver a speech in the city hall on Monday evening next, on "The Aims and Principles of the Order." Riotous Students Arrested.

MONTREAL, Oct. 23 .- A body of students from McGill university, after attending a theatrical performance last night, paraded the streets and behaved so riotously that several of them were arrested. The rest of them obtained reinforcements, marched down to the police station and attempted to take possession, but were driven off by the police, who were obliged to fire on them.

Stanley Is All Right.

LONDON, Oct. 24. - Private advices from Stanley Pool report that Henry M. Stanley had gone 150 miles further up the Aruwhim and had sent the steamer Florida back to Stanley Pool for more supplies and men. The natives showed no disposition to molest the expedition, and all were in good health. Stanley was waiting for the return of the Florida before advancing.

France and the Holy See.

ROME, Oct. 24. - Mgr. Rotelli, papal nun cio at Paris, has notified the vatican of the decision of President Grevy, Premier Rouvier and Foreign Minister Flourens to settle definitely the questions pending between France and the Holy See. The vatican has aldressed a note, asking that the French proposals be put in concrete form.

The Hughes-Hallett Case.

LONDON, Oct. 22. - Solicitor Lewis, Miss Selwyn's legal adviser, states that Colonel Hughes Hallett's infamous conduct towards the lady would have been the bases of his trial in a criminal court but for the fact that Captain Selwyn objected to his sister's appearing in any court.
