

The Condition of the Workingmen-How They Are Faring in Some Places. In the State of New York there are over

20,000 women connected with the knights of Employes of Pinkser & Co., of Brooklyn,

are on strike for union wages. The firm manufactures shoes. So far this month the strikers number

7,856; nearly one-half of these were brassworkers in New York and Brooklyn. At Wichita, Kansas, the printers receive. 35 cents for night work, and 30 cents for

Delegates from all the mines in Belleville (III.) last night met and decided to demand an advance of 12½ cents a ton for digging.

A general strike of carpenters for nine hours work has occurred at Sharon, Pa., Three firms have granted the demands Several hundred men are idle.

In Southern Indiana now there are 3,000 miners on strike. The fight promises to be a long and bitter one.

The packers at Moneliss' sugar factory in Williamsburg have had their wages reduced from 124 to 25 per cent. A strike is ex-

The 1,500 employes of the Atchison, l'opeka & Sante Fe railroad shops at Topeka. Kan., were notified lately of a reduction in the working time from 10 to 9 hours a day, with a corresponding decrease in pay.

Judge Barrett, of New York, decided that while a strike for higher wages was legal a strike for the dismissal of a rat was criminal conspiracy.

Brakemen are holding an international convention in Binghampton. There are 300 delegates present from every section of the union and Canada. The organization has a membership of 10,000.

Since the last report, July, the brotherhood of carpenters has granted charters to 32 new unions. The brotherhood has 340 local unions and upward of 42,000 members.

President Samuel Compers and his executive council have issued a call for the second session of the American federation of labour, to be held at Faltimore on Dec. 13th. The basis of representation will be as follows: For less than 4,000 members, one delegate; 4,000 or more, two delegates; 8,000 or more, three delegates, and so on

The National Employing Brickmakers' association has opened its second annual convention at Chicago. 250 delegates from every large city in the union were in attendance. Though organized but one year the association consists of bosses employing over 150,000 men, who turn out an annual product of brick and terracotta valued at over 50,000,000. The main object of the convention is the consideration of brickmaking machinery. The labour question will also be discussed. Arbitration, which has many supporters among the delegates as a means of settlement of industrial troubles, will be earnestly advocated.
