

### COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

KINGSTON MARKETS.

KINGSTON, Oct. 26 .- The barley mark t is becoming firmer every day, but dealers think the limit in price has been almost reached. There is a demand for the grain at Oswego and figures are quoted from 77c. to 92c, per bushel. In Kingston the merchant are offering from 55c. to 70c. per bushel.s The receipts are small.. Rye is not moving and worth 50c. per bush.; peas are a total failure and are only worth from 55c. to 60c. per bush.; the wheat that arrives is picked up by the millers at 75c. per bushel. Buckwheat is 50c. per bushel. The crops on the island were good and the receipts at the graineries liberal.

There is no demand in England for cattle either dead or alive; hence the dealers are not inclined to buy and keep stock on hand for local consumption. Beef sells at from \$2 to \$3.50 for four quarters and \$4 to \$5.50 for hind quarters. Mutton brings 5c. by the carcase and lambs 6c. Pork by the hog is worth \$5.50 to \$6.

Fowls are now in good demand.
