NEW YORK, Nov. 7 .- Dr. McGlynn surprised a meeting of the united labor party last week with the announcement that it was pretty nearly settled that he was to return to the priesthood and the altars of the Roman Catholic church. The women in the audience wept when they heard him comfidently impart this news. "I have all manner of evidence," he said, "that the authorities who dealt with me are beginning to see their mistake, and, then the errors which some local authorities have made will soon be corrected by higher authorities abroad. I have the assurance that after this election there will be no pastoral letter condemning the doctrines of the united labor party. There are many evidences ac cumulating to show me that those who made the mistake in my case are hoping to see some decent way of escape from it. I may go so far just now as to say that steps have been taken to present this matter before the highest church tribunal, and there to correct the injustice done. After that outrage has been repaired, I shall be ready to go back into the folds of the church, but I shall not retract a bit, and when I go back to the christian altar, as I expect to soon, I shall feel that there is no stain upon my priestly hands, heart, or head, and with no remorse for the past.
