THE STUDENTS PRANKS. The people have tired of the pranks of the students and protest against a continuation of them at places of entertainment. Now of our boys we have only kindly thoughts. We like to see their mirth, and, under all reasonable circumstances, favour the expression of it. But in the public halls, amid audiences composed of refined and sensitive people, they should restrain themselves. The peculiarities of an individual are not fit subjects for ridicule; the modesty of a companion should not be imposed upon; a taunt should not be flung at a person from concealment which it would be unwise to utter to that person's face. A decision that attracts wide attention was delivered by the supreme court of New Brunswick and in connection with the Westmoreland election case. Mr. Wood was the respondent, and because of an alleged informality in petitioning in the Election Court on 7th April a second petition was prepared and fyled on the 16th day of April in the Supreme Court. Mr. Wood was attending parliament and in a sense inaccessible, and the time to serve him was extended to May 18th. He was not then convenient and the time for serving was further extended.

The second petition was at issue on July 3rd, and two days later a date for the trial of it was asked. The judge (Fraser) did not grant it, but fixed a day, July 15th, for argument in regard to it. This argument was not finished on the day named, and was ad journed until Aug. 9th. Then the judge intimated that if he ordered the trial it would occur on Sept. 20th, and Mr. Wood's counsel objected. On Aug. 13th Judge Fraser had the matter again under consideration, and decided to try the case on Dec. 6th. Fearing legal technicalities—that the counsel for the respondent would claim that the law was not complied with, that the trial was not commenced within six months from the time the petition was presented—the petitioner's counsel asked for an earlier date, and though the judge seemed to be agreeable he did not make the change.

Their cause that which was anticipated -the application on Oct. 22nd, six days after the expiration of the six months referred to, for a stay of all proceedings and dismissal of the case. The motion was argued on Oct. 28th and 29th, and a week ago the court rendered its decision, and in accordance with the motion of the respond. ent's counsel. In a word the appointments of Judge Fraser, which he made absolute, and against which the petitioner's counsel protested in vain, had the effect of defeating the petitioners; and in ignoring these facts, and of giving a ruling on a point of law without regard to circumstance, the supreme court judges appear to have acted in an extraordinary manner. Mind you the respondent's counsel asked for a late date, got it, and took advantage of it to prevent an enquiry into the case.

It remains to be seen what effect the decision of the supreme court of New Brunswick will have upon the cases yet to be heard in this and other provinces. The local election case cannot be tried within six months from the time it was fyled, but that is no fault of the petitioner. His counsel asked as long ago as June that a date for the trial of the case be fixed, and it would be a singular thing if the court directed that proceedings in regard to it should be stopped and the petition dismissed.

The same law governs the courts of Ontario as of New Brunswick. Will the judges give it the same interpretation?

THE M. WILSON SCANDAL.

The Money Funded Him for the Exercise

of His Influence at the Court. Paris, Nov. 15, -Before the investigating committee yesterday M. Rochefort testified that Madame Selliere complained to him that M. Wilson got 2,000,000 francs from her husband for ensuring him military contracts, and that 700,000 francs were paid for a contract for rugs; also that Viscountess Frederne bribed M. Wilson with 600,000 francs toget judgment against her husband. M. Patalis testified that he had the Selliere check for the rugs contract and that it was endorsed by M. Wilson who had not questioned its effect.

Paris, Nov. 15.—The Temps, the National and the Liberte announces that the preliminary examination in the case of M. Wilson has resulted in a demaned for his prosecution. The statement has created a sensation in the legislative chambers, as it is said to involve the resignation of President Grevy. Three of the persons charged with connection with the legion of honor decoration scandals have been convicted. General D'Andlau was sentenced to prison for five years, to pay a fine of 3,000 francs and to be deprived of all civil and political rights. He has never appeared for trial. Mme. Ratazzi was sentenced to 13 months' imprisonment and to pay a fine of 2,000 francs. Mme. Courtenil was condemned to two months' imprisonment. Stianveur was acquitted.

M. Wilson must submit to a trial. Paris, Nov. 15 .- The Sciecle publishes documents showing that Leon Grevy, the nephew of the president, offered to procure a position on the Credit Foncier for a retired notary, McGrougon, for 15,000 francs. The notary paid the money but failed to obtain the position. He brought an action against Leon Grevy to recover the money, but the matter was settled before it came into court.

HELPING THE NEEDY ONES. Work Done by the Amnesty Society-The Families of the Anarchist.

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—It is announced that the Amnesty society and the defence committee join forces and assume the responsibility of providing for the families of the dead anarchists. A permanent fund will be started for that purpose. There will be, after a final accounting of the expenses of the funeral, a surplus of about \$1,500 or \$2,-000 in the hands of the defence committee, SECOND - HAND BOOKS which will form a nucleus for them to start the fund with. It is intended to make the new organization national in extent. There is another object in establishing this fund. One of the leaders said he expected there would be more money required for the purpose of the defence. He did not expect that the prosecutions would stop here but thought that others who made themselves conspicious in the movement would be prosecuted under various charges, and would necessiate a permanent defence fund.


