TORONTO SPORTS ON THE STAND. Progress in the Bingham-Bethune Capins Case at Montreal.

MONTREAL, Nov. 11 .- It is seldom the Prac tice Court holds so many of the sporting persuasion as were present to-day, when the Bingham-Elliott case was in progress. The proceedings were, perhaps, more interesting than on Saturday. To the uninitiated peculiar revelations were made as to the true inwardness of the average alleged "foot race." George Koes ter was the first to take the stand, and his evidence greatly resembled that of John Laird on Saturday, It was in substance that Elliott, Bethune, McKay and himself had chipped in \$10 apiece to pay McKay's expenses to Toronto and there arrange a race with "an unknown" whom Bingham was to produce. Bingham was to be given to understand that his man would be permitted to win, and when Bingham's money was up Bethune was to run the race out. Bethune, however, was beaten, but witness was of impression that he did his best to win. Witness had also seen two trials between Bethune and "the unknown," and he was satisfied the latter was the best runner of the two.

Ex-Ald, J. E. Mitchell of Toronto and John Cowan testified as to Bingham's character. Edward Perkins of Ottawa had seen the race

and did not see anything unfair in it. At 10 o'clock a warrant was issued for the arrest of A. R. Elliott on a charge of perjury. The point at issue is that in his first deposition he stated under oath that Bingham had induced him to bet on Bethune, whilst in his examination in the capias case he stated positively that Bingham had never personally approached him on the question. Elliott, hearing that a warrant was issued, gave himself up and found bail to the extent of \$1000, James Guest and Napoleon Cardinal being his securi-

During the morning session Mr. Macmaster

moved for permission to add to the petition an allegation that as the contract was made in Ottawa the case was subject to the law of Ontario and not Quebec. The permission was granted, and under this allegation Mr. Taylor McVeity of Ottawa was put in the witness box and examined concerning the law of Ontario covering betting, of which he gave a succinct exposition. He gave it as his opinion that in bets where a greater sum than \$10 was at stake the loser could not recover from the winner, although a case might lie against the stakeholder if he had been served with notice of protest previous to handing over the money. He also gave it as his opinion that the Ontario courts would throw such a case out, as both sides were parties to a fraudulent contract. In support of his opinion, Mr. McVeity cited the case of Davies v. Hewitt, recently decided by Chancellor Boyd, Battersby v. O'Dell, Housen v. Hancock, and several others. After a close cross-examination by Mr. Greenshield, Lem Felcher was sworn. He was proprietor of the Woodbine saloon, Toronto. Had known Bingham for about ten years. Also knew Bethune and McKay. Was not in Ottawa on the day of the race. After the race in Ottawa Bethune, in company with others, came to his saloon, The party were drinking wine. Bethune had evidently been drinking previously. In course of conversation Bethune made a demand on one Flynn or Flint for \$125. Mr. Felcher could not remember exactly the conversation, but he remembered that Bethune had said he was not going to fall down for a man he could give yarristo and then be made a "sucker" of and let other people win. Then he said something of \$250 being won and he wanted half of it, and at Flint's request Fitzgerald handed over \$125. Then Bethune said he wanted \$350 more, as some man with a plug hat had bet \$700 on him and he would not have done it unless he got a

"steer" from Fitzgerald. Felcher then gave the definition of "a steer," and remarked that he had only got one "pointer" in his life and then he went "broke" on it. In the course of his evidence Felcher said that Fitzgerald denied all knowledge of the man in the "plug" hat. Then Bethune began to get angry and Felcher advised that a settlement be come to, as he wanted no disturbance in his house, and finally the trouble was avoided by the payment to Bethune of another \$100. He had asked Bethune how much he had made out of the race, and Bethune had answered "my piece will be over \$6000."

The cross examination did not bring out any other importent development except perhaps Felcher giving vent to the sentiment that "a

sporting man's capital is his honor." George A. Maguire, barrister of Ogdensburg, N.Y., was the next witness. He knew Bethune and McKay, and had seen them both in Ogdensburg on Thursday of last week. The latter was going under the name of Goodwin. He had a conversation with Bethune. The latter had said he could beat "The Unknown" any time, and did not say anything justifying his defeat. He was quite well satisfied with the result of the race. McKay had also said to him that it was a big race, big money and little trouble winning it. They had "turned the Montreal party over," had got quite a "divvy" and had expected work. Maguire understood from what McKay said that Elliott

was the principal loser. This completed Maguire's evidence, and after cross examination the court adjourned until to-morrow.

Baseball Revisers in Session.

PITTSBURG, Nov. 14.-The joint committee of the National League and American Association on the revision of baseball rules met here to-day. The meeting is secret, but it is probable that the rule allowing a base hit for a base on balls will be aboliched and that the rule relating to "bunting" will be further amended.

A resolution was adopted that a majority of each delegation from the league and association shall be necessary to adopt any amendment changing the playing rules, and that the unanimous recommendation of the joint committee will accompany the report of such changes to the two respective associations.

The afternoon session lasted until late this evening. After adjournment the committee announced that they had agreed upon the following changes in the rules:

Rule 22, sec. 3, referring to score cards, has been amended so that any contemplated changes in teams after the publication of the score card must be submitted to the umpire for his approval.

Rule 47, relating to batsmen, has been changed as follows: If on the third strike the ball hits the person or clothing of the batsman he shall be declared out, Also after two strikes have been called if the batsman attempts to make a foul hit he shall be declared Rule 4 has been changed from four strikes and five

balls to three strikes and five balls. The rule allowing a base-hit on five balls has been abolished, but at the suggestion of President Day five balls will still be considered a factor in earned runs. A base on balls shall be counted against the pitcher in

Rule 50, Sec. 4, has been amended, allowing a runner to take a base if the ball hits the umpire. If a ball struck by the batsman hits a base runner after an attempt has been made to field, the runner shall not be declared out. If a base runner knocks down or runs into a fielder he shall be declared out.

A resolution was adopted providing for the appointment of a representative from each association to prepare an official report of the changes to send to their respective organ-

A Surprising Proposition. LONDON, Nov. 14.—Much surprise has been occasioned here by a cable from The Pail Mall Gazette's special commissioner, stating that the New York Chamber of Commerce is considering a proposal from Edward Atkinson of Boston, that the States purchase Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, on the basis of their proportion of the Canadian national debt, or \$50,000,000, as a settlement of the Fisheries question. It is considered here utterly improbable that the pro position will meet the views of Canada.
