ANARCHISTS STILL AGITATED.

The Trial of Several of Them—They Are Keeping Up the Terrorism. CHICAGO, Nov. 16.—Barney Harris, who was charged with attempting to shoot Officer Smith on Friday, after the execution, was fined \$75 for carrying concealed weapons, and held to the grand jury in \$1,500 for assault. Lobenstein, who was with him, was discharged.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 16.—Two sympathizers with the dead Chicago anarchists were adjudged insane by a commission here. They were Peter Heldt and Fred Gerhardt, the latter a travelling magician who asserted that he knew who threw the Haymarket bomb.

RACINE, Wis., Nov. 16.—Mrs. Margaret Engel claims to have been the lawful wife of Engel, the executed anarchist. She says they were married in Germany and came to Racine twelve years since, where her husband deserted her. She says she heard he subsequently married again. She recognized the anarchist as her husband by his picture.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—The police are anxiously looking for Johann Most, who, it is said, had fled the city.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—The case of Sherburne Hopkins, who sent a bogus infernal machine through the mail to Chief Justice Waite, came up to-day. He was charged with attempting to defraud a newspaper correspondent by selling him a bogus issue of news. The information was quashed and Hopkins left the court.

DUKE, Iowa, Nov. 16.—A bomb was exploded in the Iowa Iron works last night. Some twenty workmen were startled by the explosion. The bomb was made of a one and a half inch gas pipe about two feet long. Fortunately the explosion was away from the men. The building was set on fire, but the flames were speedily extinguished. The bomb was thrown through an open window. The works have had no trouble with their men. A theory is that the bomb was prepared by some one having a grudge against the workmen or an out and out anarchist.

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—"I have no use for a man who is too big a coward to make bombs to kill the police. If you won't make bombs I'll leave you." This was what Mrs. Clara Beech said with violence to her husband Rudolph. At the same time Miss Johanna Oppitz, Rudolph's sister-in-law, dashed a bucket of water in his face, and old man Oppitz joined in the melee and caught his son-in-law by the neck. Rudolph swore he would not make bombs to please his anarchist wife and her family. Yesterday he obtained warrants for the three.

MARINE PARAGRAPHS. Interesting Items Gathered Along the Harbour—Vessel Movements. Mr. Mooers has chartered the White Oak to carry bagley to Oswego.

The tug Active, and two barges laden with grain, arrived from Duluth. The steamer Kharthoum has arrived from Dog Lake with 33 tons of phosphate.

The prop. Dominion and schr. Augusta, with grain for Richardson & Son, left Port Arthur on Sunday.

The schr. B. W. Folger, Capt. Dandy, from Gananoque with barley for Oswego, passed up the lake yesterday afternoon.

The waters of Lake Ontario have lowered two feet since last May, and captains of vessels drawing twelve feet and over should guide themselves accordingly.
