Ex-warden Martin, of Prince Edward, has issued a 500 acre stock farm near Utica, N.Y.

H. W. Norris, Brautford, has been engaged as organist of St. Andrew's church, Perth.

A public meeting will be held in Trenton on Tuesday night to discuss the water power question.

Hon. G. W. Ross has been invited to attend the opening of the new high school at Campbellford.

A chap residing in Seymour east is said to have shot and bagged twenty six part-ridges in one day.

T. S. Shields, Gananoque, is a traveller, for a large boot and shoe establishment in Toronto.

R. McCrossen goes to Gananoque again, and will take charge of the C. W. Band skating rink.

A young lady of Brighton sold one hundred and twenty-three tickets for the Presbyterian tea meeting.

A boy named Wallace McDougall had his leg broken while playing football at the Colborne high school on Monday.

Prof. Jackson, Picton, has met with great success in organizing a choral society. The members already number fifty.

One or two of the Gananoque teachers in the public schools will resign at the Christmas vacation.

Mr. Farrell, Arnprior, who keeps a small hotel, was fined \$100 and costs for violation of the Scott act.

John T. Pearson, Perth, has received the appointment of car foreman in the C. P. R. repair shops at Smith's Falls.

Emile Brun, received into the Roman catholic church, Ottawa, was never a minister of the Methodist church.

The new post office's retaining walls in Pembroke are to be finished before the New Year. J. W. Munro has the contract.

The Orthodox friends have bought a lot west of Gerratt Harris, at Wellington, and intend to erect a meeting house next spring.

Brisco brothers, Osceola, have been doing big threshing. They threshed 1,100 bushels of grain in four hours on the farm of James Davis, Pembroke.

T. C. Smith, Alexandria, becomes principal of the Renfrew model school at \$700; S. H. Murphy, Pembroke, becomes classical master.

C. Deroche, Renfrew, was fined \$50 and costs for a violation of the Scott act. J. J. Wyatt, of the C.P.R., got gin and beer in the house.

Allan Stirling, Deseronto, met with a serious accident during his visit to Montreal. On the 2nd inst. he fell, breaking his leg.

Mrs. Stirling is with him. As a result of the stabbing affair Mr. G. Jeffrey, Picton, has lost 35 lbs. in weight.

The shock to Mr. Jeffrey's nervous system has been very severe. Napanee pound bailiffs, eager to capture cows, opened gates and let them out. The council had to refund the money paid to recover the bovines.

The knitting and custom woollen factory of Mr. T. A. Code, Perth, employs 65 hands, of whom 40 are girls, engaged in making hosiery.

Carleton Place will probably lose Maurice Britton, of the English church, next month. He will be ordained at the advent ordination and sent to a mission station.

While Stephen Smith, of Iryson, was carrying the mail to Kippewa Lake, his canoe swamped and although his struggles were witnessed it was impossible to save him.

T. Brennan, Gananoque, was sent to the Central prison for six months on a charge of vagrancy and keeping a disorderly house.

The other inmates are being proceeded against. Sidney Adams has purchased the lot on East bank of Gananoque River formerly occupied by the Wringer factory. Last Thursday the remains of the old building were blown down.

At division court, Renfrew, John Mavell sued B. McDermott for \$50, for damage done in an assault by McDermott some weeks ago. Judgment was given against McDermott for \$30 and costs.

The two canning factories, Picton, have closed. The output has been greater than anticipated, and a large amount of money has found its way into the pockets of the people.

At Lombardy the wife of Adam Lawson gave birth to a son. The father is 73 years of age and the mother 50. The child is reported healthy and weighs over the average.

On Thursday Mrs. Joseph Reid and Miss Agnes Barr, on behalf of the Barr congregation, presented Rev. J. C. Campbell, Douglas, with a purse of \$37.50, to buy an overcoat for the winter.

If Napanee gets water works its rating will be put in "C" class, if not it goes to "F." Underwriters say that more money is lost in Napanee by fires than a company can make in five years.

McLachlin Bros. are making extensive improvements at Rabitaile lake. A new dam is about completed, and men are blasting out rock to better facilitate the carriage of timber over the rough rapid at the foot of the falls.

Mrs. Chanonhouse, mother of Dr. Chanonhouse, Eganville, blind for months, left last August to consult Dr. Buller, Montreal. He performed two operations and the old lady, in her 78th year, is able to read small print.

On Sunday Rev. Mr. Gracey, Gananoque, preached to young men on formation of character. He forcibly pointed out the evils of drinking, betting, gambling, reading light literature, and advised them to keep clear of debt.

The government has decided to bring the Tay canal into Perth and locate the basin near the market square. The town is to be asked to contribute a share of the cost by buying the Devlin tannery property and handing it over to the government.

A. McVicar, suspected of having stolen over \$500 from A. McPhee, Arnprior, was followed by constables and arrested near Almonte. Over \$600 was found on him. He admitted having taken the money, but said he intended to return it to McPhee.

H. Halliday, of Ottawa, has been engaged to fill the position soon to be vacated in Pembroke by Mr. Nelson Williams. Mr. Hardy, New Brunswick, succeeds Mr. Murphy. Mr. Hardy is a nephew of the Hon. Peter Mitchell. Mr. Yeo, Beachburg, will fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Riley.
