A CURIOUS FIRE.

Acid on a Lake Steamer Creates Enough Heat to Ultimately Consume Her.

MARQUETTE, Mich , Nov. 18. - The steamer Arizona was] burned yesterday. When out thirty miles a heavy sea was encountered and the boat was turned about. She rolled heavily, whereupon a tank of acid began leaking and set the boat on fire. Every man was driven from his post by the fumes of the acid. There being a good head of steam on the boat kept on moving, the wheelman managing to retain his position. The steamer rounded the breakwater here, running close enough to enable the crew to jump off. The boat was then abandoned, and soon burned down to the water. The Arizona was a freight boat, valued at about \$100,000.

CRITICISING A BISHOP.

MAKING THE VOTE UNANIMOUS. Mr. Shaw said the trustees should vote unanimously in the matter. They had heard through the press certain matters which the bishop had said. His Napanee address embodied the peculiar sentiments of the christian bishop. The speaker remembered lot 24. On this plot there had been many a fight. When his father became mixed up in them and could not get Protestants to support him, his Catholic friends came to his rescue. What had he (Shaw) to fear from the Catholics? The board should advise them to do what they pleased in reference to the school matter, and fix the law for themselves.

Mr. Wilson said he could not vote for the motion. He thought the Roman Catholic clergy should get the list they asked for. It would be the means of stopping the excitement. If they could prevent occurrences such as had passed, by giving the bishop the list, why not do it? Mr. Gaskin wassurprised at Mr. Wilson's

remarks, when he knew that Catholics who sent their pupils to school did not want their names to be known. These people knew that the punishment of the church was a severe one. He hoped the board would be unanimous in its vote. Mr. Kidd said the Catholics had been withdrawing their children gradually from

the public schools since September, 1886.


