ALL AROUND THE HOUSE.

Timely Flower Notes—An Attractive Sachet—Good Things for Thanksgiving. The Persian cyclamens make fine house plants for winter, blooming from late fall till early spring. Their peculiarly shaped flowers and variety of coloring relieve the monotony of the average window collection. For this reason, as well as for their own merits, they should be more widely grown. There is hardly a prettier or more satisfactory plant for the hanging basket than oxalis. Give it a place in a sunny window and it blooms to perfection. It will not, however, do well without much sunlight.

How to Cook the Thanksgiving Bird. The secret in having a good roast turkey is to baste it often and to cook it long. So says such excellent authority on practical cooking as Mrs. Henderson. A small turkey of seven or eight pounds (the best selection, if fat) should be roasted or baked three hours at least. A very large turkey should not be cooked a minute less than four hours. If properly basted, it will not become dry. First, then, after the turkey is dressed, season it well, sprinkling salt and pepper on the inside; stuff it and tie it well in shape; either lard the top or lay slices of lard over it; wet the skin and sprinkle it well with pepper, salt and flour. It is well to allow a turkey to remain some time stuffed before cooking. Pour a little boiling water into the bottom of the dripping pan. If it is to be roasted do not put it too near the coals at first, until it gets well heated through; then gradually draw it nearer.

The excellence of the turkey depends much upon basting it frequently; occasionally baste it with a little butter, often with its own drippings. Just before taking it from the oven put on more melted butter and sprinkle more flour; this will make the skin more crisp and brown. While the turkey is cooking boil the giblets well, chop them fine and mash the liver. When the turkey is done, put it on a hot platter. Put the baking pan on the fire, dredge in a little flour and when cooked stir in a little boiling water or stock; strain, skim off the fat, add the giblets and season with salt and pepper. Mrs. Henderson adds that beside the gravy, cranberry sauce, currant or plum jelly should always be served with turkey.

Test of Kerosene Oil. The following simple test of kerosene oil is worth trying when doubts exist as to the safety of oil, and may be made by any one. Take an ordinary pint tin cup; fill it within an inch of the top with water warmed to the temperature of 130 degs. Fahrenheit; pour on this water three or four tablespoonfuls of the oil and water together, and wait a minute or two for the oil to collect on the top. Try the thermometer again, and if the temperature is more than one deg. from 130 degs. Fahrenheit add a little cold or hot water, as the case may be, so as to bring the temperature to within one deg. of 130 Fahrenheit. Then stir again and give time, as before, for the oil to come to the top. Now apply a burning match or lighted taper on a level with the top of the cup, say within half an inch of the oil. If within one second no flash occurs the oil is reasonably safe; otherwise it is unsafe.

A Novel and Pretty Sachet. Quite novel in the way of those pretty sachets of which a woman never has too many is one described by Dorcas and shown in the cut.



A RIBBON BOW SACHET. It is made of satin ribbon two inches wide, tied in a bow with full loops and ends, the ends cut in two points. On each end of the bow, and also on the loops, flowers and mottoes may be embroidered or painted. The loops are filled in with wadding, sprinkled with sachet powder, heliotrope, violet or whatever may be preferred. The edges of the ribbon loops are then caught together with silk of the same shade as the ribbon, and if two or three artificial or paper roses with foliage and soft stems are run through the loop they make a pretty addition.

Decorative Shades for Lamps. Ladies who use lamps are fond of a constant change of shades, and a pretty arrangement can be contrived with ordinary square, thin silk handkerchiefs. Pale blue is a good color to use. Rose color is also pretty and is a pale clear yellow. A circle the size of the top of the globe is traced in the center of the handkerchief. Stitch closely around the circle, then cut away the center, and button-hole the edge all around. Trim the lower edge with a frill of fine lace or a very narrow silk fringe. Many variations can be made in the style of trimming, etc., and a figured handkerchief may be used if preferred.

The Pie of the Season. Pumpkin pie, the time honored dessert of the Thanksgiving dinner, may be nicely made as follows: Peel and slice a pumpkin or part of one; boil it in boiling water until it is tender enough to rub through a sieve with a potato masher; mix with each quart a custard made of six eggs beaten with eight tablespoonfuls of sugar and a quart of milk; flavor with spice and grated lemon rind, and bake in a deep earthen pie plate lined with pastry. The same recipe answers for squash pie.

A New Kind of Ambrosia. Instead of the usual sliced oranges, pare and cut into small pieces a thoroughly ripe pineapple. Put a layer of pineapple in a glass dish and sweeten it; add a layer of grated cocoanut and continue in alternation till the dish is full, having cocoanut for the last layer. Angel cake or sponge served with this furnishes a delightful combination.

Table Furnishings. The large caster is seldom seen except in hotels. Table sauces are put on in their original bottles, and olives, pickles and the like are placed about the table in small fancy dishes. More attention than is usually bestowed might well be given to the breakfast table. Flowers or a flowering plant in the center give a fresh and dainty look.

Gilt Frames Brightened. Gilded picture frames that are dull do not always need regilding. One way of brightening them up, recommended by good authority, is to apply a coating of damp fuller's earth, and when this is dry wash off with a sponge moistened in ox gall.

Keeping Bulbs Through Winter. The principal point of keeping bulbs of gladioli, hyacinth, tube rose, dahlias, lilies and the like, safely through the winter, is to be sure that they are dry when put away and are kept dry. Dampness will ruin them.

The Women of Italy. Nearly one-half of the Italian nation is yet uneducated, notwithstanding the efforts of enlightened statesmen to found and maintain common schools. From this night of ignorance the women of course will be the last to escape, and they will continue to hoe the fields, to dig around the vines, to ply the distaff, to weave and knit, as they do now. Not that any of the occupations are useless, for they add to the comfort and wealth of the nation; but with better education these women will learn greater cleanliness in the home, new arts of sewing and cooking, and will have clearer views of life and of the world. While they have grown brown in the sun, and hard handed, and bent with tilling the soil, the other half of their countrywomen have worn out their eyes and become thin and pale by the use of the needle or the bobbin in cloisters or in palaces. The extraordinary industry of Italian ladies and nuns was shown at the recent exposition of laces, stuffs and embroideries at Rome. This was chiefly an exposition of women's labor, and was a wonderful display of gauzy lace, fine as a spider's web, wrought into pictures of sacred scenes, and of Venetian point a yard wide made for a priest's surplice, or for the coronation robe of a queen. The governing thought of woman found expression through the needle. The nun wrought patiently for years, perhaps for a lifetime, upon the red damask tapestries, like the famous ones of Siena, now 500 years old and still in excellent condition. There remain pictured in almost invisible stitches the golden haired Madonna of her prayers and dreams, the saints, the beatified ones in whom she trusted.—Home Journal.
