



Mr. Powderly Expresses His Views on the

Matter At Some Length. PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 25,-T. V. Powderly, master workman of the knights of labor, commences the publication of a series of letters containing suggestions upon which a popular vote of the members may soon be asked. . The first letter deals with the land question. Mr. Powderly joins issue with the common property theory. He affirms the charges against speculators and greedy landlords, but gives the knights of labor the credit of forcing the fight "until now are seen public officials, legislators, heads of departments, senators and the president himself stretching forth their hands to save the heritage of the people." "Individuals," he says, "might have raised their voices in vain; they might have written and prayed; isolated organizations of men might have petitioned the lawmakers not to give away the lands, and their voices, prayers and petitions would have gone forth unheeded had not the united voice of men and women who believed and declared that 'not another acre for railroads or speculators should be given or bartered away forever. To no other organization belongs the credit of calling attention to the ravages of the land speculator. Knightsof labor have kept that question prominently before the people in season and out of season, and before our mission is ended the unholy grasp of the speculator and the alien landlord will be removed from the soil forever. To-day in every town and hamlet the land question is being studied and the simple proposition of the knights of labor stands up in giant form before every man and woman who toils and feels an interest in the country we inhabit. Theories are advanced which in themselves sound very nice as to the ownership of all the land by the people 'in common.' Before that object can be attained the people must learn to think in common. It must first be demonstrated that the idea is practicable. I once believed that the people could own and till the soil in common. I did not believe that it was right for an individual to hold absolute ownership in the soil. To-day I know that an individual cannot hold absolute title to the soil if the interests of the people 'in common' require it should be no longer believe that the people 'in common' can till the soil and own it in common; first, because they do not think in common; second, because the people are only people and not angels. In other words, the people are not good enough yet to discard the native selfishness which was born in them. We must take men and women as we find them. As we find men and women to-day, they are selfish and grasping. Each one has a desire to own and control a home of his own and my efforts will be put forth to the end that each man who wishes to may own his home. If every man owned his home, labour would be more appreciated than it is. The desire to reduce the hours of labour would be greater, for every man would have a place on which to expend his spare moments. Setting aside the future of the land, the one idea on which all men can unite is that the land should be kept free from sharks, speculators, knaves and land grabbers. native, naturalized or alien. On this principle the knights of labour have united over a million people, for no matter how many members may have drifted away, they were a unit on that question and still believe it true."
