FINANCING IN LONDON.

Some of Henry Taylor's Victims—Action of Some of the Creditors.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—Since the suspension of the Bank of London and the failure of the Ontario investment association, there has been a current rumor that John R. Laing & Co., one of the largest wholesale dry-goods firms in Western Ontario, were seriously embarrassed. It is now publicly announced that the firm has failed. The liabilities are enormous, the creditors being principally English manufacturing houses in Manchester and Leeds.

LONDON, Nov. 29.—A meeting of the Ontario Investment association was held this afternoon. Violent language was plentiful. The chair was occupied by F. A. Fitzgerald, who stated that all delinquent shareholders had to pay their obligations before Dec. 1st.

W. R. Meredith reported that this plan had brought several delinquents to time. In reply to a question asked by A. O. Graydon, W. R. Meredith said that Isaiah Danks, late director of the Bank of London and ex-director of the Ontario Investment association was debtor to the association for large sums, being responsible for \$53,000 and another \$2,700. On either of these obligations had anything been paid, and nothing was known of the chances for payment. The meeting was also informed that the name held by them for the above amount was no good.

A. O. Graydon and Arthur Wallace urged that Danks be proceeded against criminally. The meeting was informed that W. P. R. Street had received a cablegram from the English bondholders suggesting that some independent person be appointed to classify the securities of the association in order to show the bondholders they would be safe in waiting for payment. This suggestion was favorably received.

Ven. Archdeacon Marsh held that the first claims on the association were those of the English and Scotch bondholders. Mr. W. R. Meredith denied the assertion that Daniel MacFie was a defaulter. That person held 500 shares, on which he paid \$25,000 cash, and the balance of his obligations were secured.

Then followed an exciting debate as to the manner of prosecuting Henry Taylor and the other defaulters.

W. R. Meredith said that grave consideration should be given to the matter of criminally prosecuting for various reasons, it being known that others are guilty of almost as much dishonesty as Henry Taylor, and further, Taylor was liable to die at any moment.

Mr. R. M. Meredith conscientiously disbelieved the statement that Henry Taylor was any worse than when he stole the money. Justice must not be defeated by such a subterfuge as shamming ill.

M. D. Fraser said Taylor might drop dead at any moment, he was so bad. After a long discussion two resolutions were voted on by the meeting. One to prosecute criminally every director and officer against whom a charge could be proved was lost. The following was carried:

"That the matter of criminal prosecution against Henry Taylor and other officers and directors of the association be deferred, and that Arthur Wallace, H. Thompson, John Johnson, A. O. Graydon and James Griffiths be a committee to examine all books and report on the specific charges."

GREAT UNION MEETING.

The Largest Assembly that Lord Hartington Has Ever Addressed.

DUBLIN, Nov. 30.—The great unionist meeting, was held this evening. Hundreds of leading citizens, and bishops and clergy were present.

The chairman handed to Lord Hartington an address approving his policy and signed by thirteen hundred members of the chamber of commerce.

Lord Hartington never before had addressed such a large assembly. He said they had never shown that Ireland would be satisfied with limited home rule. On the contrary there was every indication that they would not be satisfied except with entire separation. The struggle was more for the possession of the land than for the reform of the present system of government, and the Gladstonians admitted that the land difficulty must not and could not be left to an Irish parliament to settle. He concluded with a repudiation of the charge that he had changed his opinions with regard to the question of local government in Ireland, and had ignored the national sentiments of the country.

DUBLIN, Nov. 30.—Mr. Goschen followed and was received with prolonged cheering. He arraigned the liberals and nationalists whom he said were deceiving the Irish people and said that those who denounced the league for spreading the doctrine of repudiation of contract are the truest friends of Ireland.
