A Young Man Who Says He Can Locate Hell-He Knows All About it,

New YORK, Dec. 3. - A young colored man who calls himself Casar A. Taylor is making himself notorious by his actions. At one church he said : "I've been preaching hell all over this country, Europe, Asia and Africa, for the last fifteen years and I think I ought to know something about it. Hell is going to be my life work, and before I die I am going to prove hell to the great scientific minds of the age. As Columbus fully demonstrated that there was another continent to Queen Isabella, and Galileo that the earth was spinning, and they were held to be cranks, so I want to be the only original, real discoverer of the land of hellfire and brimstone." After proving conclusively that the earth was a cold ball, getting how, and not a hot one getting cold, as science was bringing the youth of the world to believe, Mr. Taylor showed that there were but fifty-two miles of earth crust between humanity and a molten lake of 250,542,093, 858 miles of fiery matter. "The earth's crust," said he, "is growing less and less in thickness and there will come a time when the inhabitants will drop through it. Is it hell? Drop in and see.

The audience declined. In fact, they seemed to receive Mr. Taylor's ideas very coldly. 'Next Sunday evening," says the Herald, "Rev. E. E. Jackson will wipe Mr. Taylor and his theories of hell out of existence from the same pulpit."

BIG FIRE IN GUELPH.

It Gets Into the Commercial House-The Narrow Escape of the Guests.

GUELPH, Dec. 3.—The royal city was never visited by a fire which endangered so many lives as that of last night's in connection with the burning of the Commercial hotel. It is one of the largest hotels in the city. The flames had made great headway when the inmates were awakened, and, as the fire originated near the hall, on the first flat, escape by the stairway was impossible. All had to jump from the windows.

It would have been death by suffocation to have waited for the hook and ladder company. Some jumped from the fourth story on the adjoining roof. Most of 'hem, however, leaped from the second and third stories. Bairds' opera company were stopping at the hotel. All its members escaped in their night clothes. The domestics and lady boarders were taken to other hotels and provided for.

Mr. Hough, the proprietor, with his family of thirteen, slept on the second floor. Mr. Hough was severely injured in rescuing his children, and is now in the hospital. Some of the boarders and domestics who jumped from the upper stories were also injured and taken to the hospital. None are supposed to be seriously injured. Loss and insurance cannot be ascertained.

THE LABOUR COMMISSION.

Evidence Given by Expert Witnesses Manual Instruction is Urged.

TORONTO, Dec. 3.—Before the labor commission W. Houston gave valuable testimony on industrial education. He thought the Kindergarten was an admirable system, and believed the principle should be extend ed to the public schools. The public schools could be used for industrial education without changing the programme very much The government should maintain schools for manual training with illustrative machinery. Henry Lloyd, of the carpenters' union, believed that organization was a direct benefit to labor. He believed the union favored arbitration. A great cause of dispute between employee and employer was that an unskilled mechanic was placed at the bench with a skilled workman, and the boss endeavored to reduce the wages of the skilled to that of the unskilled. Unskilled men should be employed as laborers only and paid as such.

MURDER NEAR OTTAWA

A Fight Between Brothers-One Strikes the Other Fatally on the Head.

OTTAWA, Dec. 3.-At Rochesterville, near here, a fight took place between two brothers, Lambert and Eli Desormeaux, resulting in the latter's death. Eli proposed that his brother pay for a drink, which request was refused. Eli then obtained some liquor and the two took a drink. Lambert's refusal to take a second led to the quarrel. The prisoner was at first knocked down and beaten, but as soon as he got up he seized a snow shovel and struck his brother over the head, fatally wounding him. Lambert Desormeaux is in custody.

VERY PÉCULIAR DISEASE.

The Doctors Don't Understand It-And It Is Fatal in Its Effects.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, Dec. 3.-James Donaldson, a passenger on 'the steamer Alesia, quarantined at New York on account of cholera being on board, was taken sick shortly after his arrival at New Bedford, and died of a peculiar disease. Black spots appeared on his body, and a day or two later the undertaker became affected with the same disease and is seriously ill. Donaldson died on Wednesday, and his son, daughter, and a dozen residents of the town are down.

Sudden Death in Ramsay.

ALMONTE, Dec. 3.-Mrs. John Cannon, Ramsay, died in a terribly sudden manner. Attending to household duties she suddenly called for a drink of water, and fell to the floor. She died a minute or two later. Apoplexy was the cause.

ALL CHAOS IN FRANCE.

THE LAST MESSAGE SENT OUT BY EX-PRESIDENT GREVY.

He is Forced Out of Office by Parliament-Does Not Think it Well to Resist the Demands Made for His Resignation-

Feeling of the People. Paris, Dec. 3 .- The deputies received the message concerning Grevy's resignation with profound silence. M. Floquet read a letter from the president of the senate, summoning a congress of the two chambers at Versailles to morrow for the purpose of elec-ting a new president. The sitting then closed amid cries of "Vive La Republique."

PARIS, Dec. 3.—The text of M. Grevy's message is as follows: 'So long as I had only to contend with the difficulties that have accumulated in my path, the attacks of the press, the abstention of the men whom the public voice called to my side, and the increasing impossibility to form a ministry, I struggled on and remained where duty bade me, but at the moment where public opinion, better informed, marked a change which gave me hope of forming a govern-ment the senate and chamber of deputies voted a double resolution which, under the form of an adjournment to a fixed hour to await the president's promised message, is tantamount to summoning the president to resign. It would be my duty and right to resist, but, under the circumstances in which we are placed, a conflict between the execu tive and parliament might entail consequences which restrain me. Wisdom and patriotism command me to yield.

Paris, Dec. 3.—A number of members of the two legislative chambers held a session in the Palais Bourbon this afternoon for the purpose of balloting for a president, preparatory to the election by the congress at Ver sailles to morrow. The first ballot opened at 3:30 p.m., and closed at 4:30. The result was: Floquet, 101; DeFreycinet, 94; Brisson, 56; Sadi Carnot, 49; Ferry, 19; Failliere's, 3; Grevy, 2. A second ballot was then taken.

Paris, Dec. 3. - The theatres were almost deserted last night. The hotels patrenized by foreigners are rapidly being emptied. There were large withdrawls of bank deposits yesterday. M. M. Gavardie, Lemoinne and Le Castard supported M. Grevy in the senate, and M. M. Gillet, Guillot and De Maby supported him in the chamber of deputies. Some who had advised the president not to resign voted against him.

PARIS, Dec. 3. - The Comte de Paris instructed the members of the right to vote for Gen. Saussier before he knew that Saussier had retired from the contest. He has now sent fresh instructions. The revolu tionary parties and press are sparing no efforts to incite the mob to violence.

PARIS, Dec. 3. - There was a stormy discussion at the meeting of the municipal council yesterday on the action of the prefect of the Seine, who, at the order of the government, had the under-ground passage leading from the Hotel DeVille to the police barracks cleared and gave the keys to the colonel of the republican guard. The prefect explained that the government was determined to ensure the safety of the public edifices. Finally an order of the day was adopted calling on the prefect to deliver the keys to the syndic of the council, and to take no further protective measures. Among the curious rumours present is one that De Freycinet, a year ago, secretly entered the Roman Catholic church with a view to his accession to the presidency.

Paris, Dec. 3. - The second trial ballot by the senators and deputies of the left at Verrsailles this morning, for a candidate for the presidency, resulted as follows: Ferry, 216; De Frevcinet, 196; Brisson, 79; and Sadi Cornot, 61.

M. Floquet has withdrawn his resignation as president of the chamber of deputies. Military reinforcements are arriving in

Paris, Dec. 3.-M. Sadi-Carnot has been elected president of the republic.

THE SCOTT ACT CASES.

Action of the County Council's Finance Committee-Paying the Money.

A meeting of the tinance committee of the county of Frontenac was held to-day in the court house for the purpose of discussing the judgment given at a meeting of the court of chancery in the case, License Commissioners v. County of Frontenac. The action was brought by defendants to secure from the county its share of the expenses in enforcing the Scott act since it was established. Mr. R. T. Walkem, solicitor for the county, advised the committee to drop further proceedings in the matter at present. If they chose they could give notice of appeal which would not cost anything, but would give them an opportunity to go turther in the matter if a verdict against the statute bearing on the Scott act were, got by any other county council. After considering Mr. Walkem's advice it was moved by Dr. Brown, seconded by Mr. Murton, that the finance committee authorize the county treasurer to pay the claim in this suit decided against the county in favour of the license commissioners, and that all further proceedings be stayed. The following sub-committee was struck to examine the accounts for costs in the suit : Messrs. Murton, Hogan and Dr.

INSANE MOTHER'S CRIME.

Chops Her Child's Head to Pieces With a Hatchet-She is Insane,

SCRANTON, Pa., Dec. 3.-Mrs. John Evans, the wife of an industrious miner, killed her five year-old son this morning just after her husband had left his home for work. She procured a hatchet and chopped the child's head to pieces. In her frenzy she also hacked the little fellow's throat with the hatchet, evidently intending to sever the head from the body. The woman then prepared to kill her little daughter, four years of age, but the intervention of the neighbours prevented a second butchery. The boy lingered for several hours in grea agony. Mrs. Evans is insane.

Clarke's Chances Slim.

TORONTO, Dec. 3. - The Mail, after stating its opinion that E. F. Clarke is an able and upright man, and on the whole the better candidate for mayor, says it will support Ald. Rogers because of certain interests which are at Clarke's back. All the Toronto papers except the News are against Clarke.

Another Fatal Accident.

Pottsville, Penn., Dec. 3.—The locomoand Reading railway exploded near East Mahony junction. Alexander Walker, the engineer, was instantly killed. The fireman and two brakesmen were so severely injured that they died while being taken home.

GAY MRS. WONG CHIN FOO.

SHE AND FRIENDS RAISE CAIN IN AN APARTMENT HOUSE.

The Proprietor Kicked Downstairs and a Member of St. George's Church Arrested for the Assault-Life in New York and What it Sometimes Leads To.

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.-Wong Chin Foo is one of the few Chinamen who has had the bravery to forsake his country, give up his devotion to the shrine of the dragon, cut off his pig-tail and become an American citizen. He even went further and took unto himself an American wife. This wife, who is a pretty, petite blonde, was captivated by Wong Chin Foo's bank account and his rising future, and was a model of perfection as long as her lord and master toasted his toes on his own hearthstone.

They were like two turtle doves, Mrs. Wong Chin Foo being proud of the affection and love shown her, and even at the present time the dapper little Mongolian is unaware of the trouble that will darken his domestic

For six months Mrs. Wong Chin Foo has been domiciled in a lodging house controlled by Mr. and Mrs. Frank, Hotalin: Mr. Foe introduced his wife to Mrs. Hotalin, explaining that he was connected with a morning paper and under contract to lecture. Mrs. Hotalin was impressed with the personal appearance of Mrs. Foo. Not wishing to address her as Mrs. Wong Chin Foo, which grated on the sensitive nerves of the lady, the name of Mrs. Wilson was substituted, that being the lady's maiden name. All went well until a week ago, when other roomers came to Mrs. Hotalin with a complaint that they did not like the actions of

Mrs. Wilson in her husband's absence. Mrs. Hotalin was loath to believe any thing derogatory to the character of her pretty lodger and decided that she must have occular proof before ejecting her, as the complaining roomers requested.

She immediately called upon Mrs. Wilson and found the door locked. "Who's there !" came in birdlike accents.

"Mrs. Hotalin. Open the door! I wish to speak to you." Still the door would not open, and only upon Mrs. Hotalin's threat to break it in did Mrs. Wilson open the door a few inches. Mrs. Hotalin then pushed the door open. and, to her surprise, found a young man named Cunningham hiding behind it, Cunningham bolted in undignified haste, and

Mrs. Hotalin, with few words, told Mrs. Foo to leave the house. At this time Mrs. Foo owed a \$20 rent bill, and Mr. Hotalin went after her trunk, but it had been removed. He knew that it had not been carted away, so he made a search and found it in Cunningham's room, It was quickly removed to Mr. Hotalin's

Mr. Hotalin said: "On Saturday night I went to my house to look it over and see that everything was ship-shape. My wife had told me that on that day she had found Mrs. Wong Chin Foo in an attic room talking to a man named Muir. I wanted to satisfy myself that everything was all right, but before I left I found it was all wrong. 1 was sitting in the first hallway when I was pounced upon by Cunningham and a Wall street broker named Baldwin. I ran down stairs and was then confronted by three more men who attacked me. I got into the area and was there downed, and done up in the most approved style. Both eyes blacked, my finger chewed nearly off, my head nearly fractured by kicks from Baldwin, and

kicked black and blue all over. "After they got through with me I got home and was ill and delirious. I had Cunningham, Baldwin and Muir arrested, and they are out on bail. The Rev. Henry Wil son, D.D., of St. George's church, came to me and told me that Baldwin was a member of his church, the father of three children, that his wife was an estimable woman, and that he could not believe that Baldwin could be mixed up in such a disgraceful

LOCKING THEM ALL UP.

Warrants Are Out for the Arrest of Several of the Irish Leaders.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3 .- The Tribune's Dub lin says warrants have been issued for the arrest of T. M. Healy, Michael Davitt, and Mr. Dennihy, the lord mayor's secretary. The evident design is to arrest before Christmas all the leaders of the people, in the hope of thereby breaking up the popular erganization.

William O'Brien's jailors seem to have given up the idea of contending with him. At least his overcoat has been restored to him, and the governor of Tullamore gaol has promised that there will be no other attempt to deprive him of his clothes.

The government has refused to accept bail for Mr. Sheehy, the member for South Galway, although his wife is seriously ill in Dublin.
