





There have been three vacancies in the Gananoque high school board, owing to the death of D. F. Britton, and the removal of J. McPharland and Dr. Merrick. The county council appointed to the vacancies Messrs. C. E. Britton, O. V. Goulette, and W. C. Carroll.

Messrs, Saylor & Ward, Consecon, made a cleaning out of their storehouse on Saturday. This firm was the first to raise the price of barley from 65c. to 70c. per bushel. During the coming year they will have their storehouse thoroughly repaired.

The old Belgian cannon in front of the court house, Perth, have been thoroughly repaired. These cannon were taken from the British by the Americans at the Saratoga surrender in the revolutionary war, then recaptured from the Yankees at the battle of Crysler's farm on Canadian sod in the war of 1812-15. They were afterwards donated

a committee of management. James Reid, sr., Camden, was born 86 years ago, in Tyrone, Ireland. He first settled in Kingston, where for a time he was employed at the government works. He next resided in Ernesttown, and finally set tled in Camden. Mrs. Reid died over a year ago and since her demise the old gentleman was scareely ever out of doors. He passed peacefully away on 17th Nov. Out of a family of twelve children four sons and

three daughters are living. There are also alive forty four grand children.

Dr. Thomas Shirley, another of the landmarks of Napanee, died on Nov. 28th, in his 73rd year. He was not only one of the first residents of the town, but one of the oldest practising physicians in this part of the province. Deceased was born in Ireland, his father being a Church of England clergyman. The family emigrated in 1820, and took up their residence at Camden East. His father built the Anglican church at that place. Deceased began the study of medicine in Kingston in 1834. He graduated in 1841 from which date he began his practice in Napanee. He continued in active work until about nine years ago. He was able to walk out occasionally but not to attend business. About six weeks ago more serious symptoms were apparent and his decline was very rapid. In 1850, Dr. Shirley married Margaret Ann, daughter of Daniel Pringle, of Napanee, who survives him.

HE WAS FROM KINGSTON.

Spellman One of the Best Jockeys in the World-Where He Began Life. The New York Spirit of the Times has

the following: "John Spellman's death has been the subject of more discussion than any event of the week in racing circles. And well it might, for Spellman has filled so prominent a part in the theatre of the turf for the past thirteen years as a jockey, trainer and owner that there is scarcely a race goer around New York who did not know him. John Spellman was a Canadian, like Lee, Donohue, Blaylock and many of our best jockeys, and at the time of his death was in his 29th year. He learned riding in Kingston, Ont., under the late Mike Murphy, one of the best steeplechase riders of the day. Spellman always said his victory on Vigil over Bill Hayward on St. Martin, in 1876, was the hardest race he ever rode, and it certainly was one of the most exciting ever run on this continent."
