COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

THE KINGSTON MARMETS I

KINGSTON, Dec. 7. - Frosty weather changes the aspect inside and around the market. Women have donned warm hoods and the regulation shoulder shawl, and small stoves have been started in the shambles. Piles of celery cabbage, etc., are protected with canvas coverings, and barrels of vegetables are rolled into sheltered places.

The butter market is active. Good creamery stock sells for from 27c. to 30c. a lb.; very fine roll butter is to be had for 24c. and 25c. Cooking butter costs from !Sc. to 20. There is no change in the price of

There is a fair supply of eggs and what is known as ordinary stock. These cost 25c. to 27c. a doz. Limed eggs are very plentiful at 20c. to 22c. a duz. There will not be any particular advance in the price of eggs before the holidays, unless there should be a heavy snowstorm, which stops hens from laying. Housewives should be on the safe side, however, and make rich cakes that will keep and often are improved by age now. Limed eggs are sweet-flavored and good for cake making, although net always to be depended upon for lightness as surely as strictly fresh ergs.

The fine weather of last week has proved a great boon to housekeepers in the saving of fuel, but has not tended to increase business. Merchants crave for a snow storm in order that there may be sleighing for the holidays. They claim that business always at Christmas time is made brisk by the presence of snow and hard freezing weather. During the past week the weather has been indeed summerlike, and more like weather that should be experienced in September. At present there are no indications of a snow storm, but none can tell what a day may bring forth. Possibly when our next issue appears there will be plenty of the beautiful for ordinary purposes. The warm weather, however, does not cause dealers to reduce the price of fuel. Hardwood sells at \$4.25 to \$4.75 per cord, with softwood at \$2.50 to \$3 per cord. Coal has not advanced in price. The demand for it at present is light. Most of the consumers have secured their supply. All the coal that will come by boat is in There is none at Oswego for shipment to Canada.

The trade in fowls, which is always lively at this season of the year, has not lost any of its activeness since last week. The farmers take advantage of the market days, to work in their stock, of fowls, chickens, and geese, chickens sell-from 30c, to 50c, per pair, and turkeys and geese bring Sc. and 9c. per lb. Ducks are scarce and dear, 70c. to 80c.

per pair. No change has taken place since last report in the quotations of meat, grain, hay and straw. Hay is \$14 to \$15.

A good demand for potatoes, at old figures \$1 per bag; Beets, 75c. per bag; apples; \$2.50 to \$3 per barrel; inferior grades of apples, 75c. to \$1 per bag.


