A DISMISSAL OCCURS.

Hon, Mr. Jones has been spared a trial, its worry and its possibilities, by the decision of a Halifax judge to the effect that the petition against his election, not having been dealt with by the courts within the six months' limit, cannot now be dealt with at all. Mr. Jones is a clever man, and a liberal, and all are glad to see that 'he is not likely to be missing-by being unseated ported from Kingston, in which a common and left unseated-from the next meeting of parliament, but the personal gratification felt by his friends regarding his escape from the prosecution of political opponents is one thing, and a peculiar and technical and troublesome interpretation of the law is an. other. In Nova Scotia and New Brunswick the petitions entered within the six months of their fyling, including the time during which parliament sat, have been abandoned, because the judges will not try them irrespective of the circumstances under which the delay occurred; in Ontario the cases go on and as a result, unless the purity practiced by the Kingston politicians has not been exceptional after all, there may be a number of new elections. Now this anomalous condition of things cannot be continued. Parliament must make the election law explicit and beyond dispute.

A SINGULAR CONTRAST.

In peculiar contrast with the sentiments of the Montreal Gazette-whose fiery party. ism blinded it to the merit and design of the agreement into which the political parties in Kingston entered prior to the last elec tion and made it twist the following up of that agreement by the liberals into a crimnial offence—is this from the Mail:

"But there is one other excellent moral in the Kingston trial. It appears that both the conservatives and liberals are declared to have conducted a pure canvass. There can be no doubt that this was the result of the agreement not to bribe. Kingston has not always been a model constituency. In order to prove the purity of the election a trial had to occur. Prior to it some men were believed by their fellows to be guilty of a violation of the law as well as of the agreement, and there was no way of dissipating false impressions but by holding a judicial investigation. It is too much to say that the liberals of the city went to all the expense and annoyance of a trial for the purpose of proving the inrocence and purity of their opponents, but that has been the effect of the case, and the conservatives should offer them thanks instead of abuse.

FUNNY CRITICISMS.

There is no funnier reading now-a-days | Que. than the criticisms of the tory press upon the Kingston election case. Let it not be supposed that they were intended to be funny, but they are so, and in proof of this assertion we have only to quote the Brockville Times, whose thunderbolt took the following shape:

"Throughout the progress of the trial the evidence has gone to show that the pushers in the matter were a set of beggarly ruffians meaner than dirt, and dirtier, mentally and morally, than the meanest convict in the penitentiary in that city. The brazen effrontery of these political washrags to dare to impugn many, the mud from whose shoes they were not fit to wipe, and to attempt to support their accusations by hired testifiers, shown to be utterly devoid of goodness of character, is almost sublime in its collossal dimensions. Throughout the trial the evidence has gone to show that Sir John and his agents were comparatively blameless, while his prosecutors were per sons who had agreed to pay two witnesses a reward of one hundred dollars each if they be so easily secured to trump up charges against innocent men, in order that the party organs may make capital out of it by publishing throughout the country that a petition has been entered against the return of Sir John A., and that it bristles with terrible accusations. Sir John also has been put to considerable annoyance by these base less attacks, and it seems a pity that the movers in the conspiracy to unseat him can-

not be punished as they deserve." Nor is this all. The Belleville Intelligencer, which is annoyed beyond measure by the errors of its contemporaries, halts, in its wild charges upon the commercial unionists, long enough to say that "conclu-

sive evidence that the grit party are still unrivalled as adepts in electoral corruption is cropping up on all hands." CARLISLE-RANDALL.

Democrats But Leading Opposing Forces on the Tariff Issue.

The two statesmen likely toshare in about equal measure the attention of the whole country during the session of the United States congress are Samuel J. Randall, of Pennsylvania, and John G. Carlisle, of Kentucky. The one as speaker of the house of representatives, and the other as chairman of the committee on appropriations, occupy positions that will have control of legislation on the question of such a reduction or modification of the tariff as will result in a decrease of the revenue of the government to the extent of more than one hundred million dollars annually. Both gentlemen and their followers declare that the surplus must be reduced, but they differ materially upon the methods to be adopted to secure the result with least injury to business as conducted under existing laws.

Mr. Randall seems ready to have the internal revenue taxes summarily abolished regardless of the effect on the national revenue. He declares that they were justified originally only as a resource in war times, and that they are repugnant to the theory of our government. Mr. Carlisle thinks that reduction should be first made in custom duties on necessaries of life.

Mr. Randall is not likely to yield any part of his position on his general policy of protection to American industry, while it is understood that Mr. Carlisle leans strongly to a policy that, would ultimately result in absolute international free trade.
