

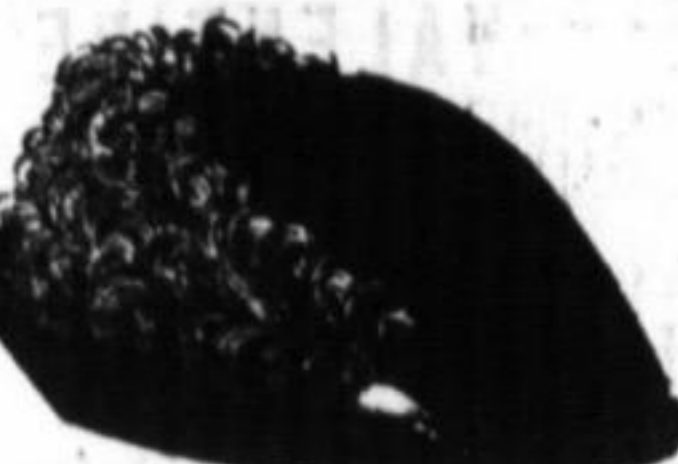

A CARDINAL ON LABOR.

His Eminence of Quebec Replies to Questions From the Royal Commission. QUEBEC, Nov. 25, 1887.

A. H. Blackeby, Esq., Secretary of the Royal Labor Commission, Ottawa.

Sir,—In response to your request to know my feelings on certain questions concerning the objects of the royal commission, of which you are the secretary, I will present my views on some of these questions.

1. Child labor. 2. Female labor. I unite these two points as they are very closely related.

Means must be found to protect morals, in and out of the factories, before the time of entrance and after the time of exit. Employees in petty authority sometimes abuse their authority and the law should severely restrain such.

The work demanded from women and children should not be too severe or too steady. A short pause in the middle of the forenoon and of the afternoon will save much misery and illness, and manufacturers will be easily compensated as refreshed workpeople work to better advantage.

3. Sanitary arrangement of factories. I have frequently heard priests of my diocese say that the majority of the people working in factories, and especially girls, return to their families feeble from overwork and afflicted with pulmonary complaints caused by insufficient ventilation in factories.

The air is thick with the smell of oil and with dust disseminated by the action of the engines and of the employees, and the lungs become unable to perform their functions. On the other hand the ventilation itself, if not in accordance with hygienic rules, may cause disease.

4. Arbitration. 5. Strikes and their results. Strikes are among the greatest dangers to society, as they too frequently degenerate into deplorable disorders. It seems to me that it would be useful to establish a tribunal of arbitration, absolutely independent of the interested parties, to settle the difficulties from which the strikes arise.

His eminence Cardinal Gibbons, who, it is well known, pays a great deal of attention to labor problems, desires very much that such tribunals be established in the United States. There is no doubt that a law on this subject would encounter many difficulties, but time and experience will perfect it. Accept, Mr. Secretary, the assurance of my best consideration.

A COLLISION OF CHINAMEN.

A Scene at the Graveyard—A Collection of Rare Curiosities.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 9.—Lee Way, the Chinaman, who was killed in a quarrel between Boin Beer and Giesin Seersocieties, was buried yesterday. The faction to which he belonged made a great demonstration, and invited an attack from the enemy, but the police were out in force and had a galling gun in readiness to quell a street battle.

All white persons were warned to keep out of Chinatown. The Chinese consul general's proclamation, offering \$250 for the arrest of any man discharging a pistol at another was torn down and the police had to protect the Chinese official who replaced it. Several Chinese bands led the funeral of Lee Way, and the grave was covered with offerings of roast duck and pork, and baskets of rice, while hands full of money were thrown in the huge fire by the grave to give the slaughtered Chinaman a good start in the other world.

LONGLEY'S LAST LETTER.

It Treats of Commercial Union—The Issue is Forced Upon the Country.

PORTLAND, Me., Dec. 10.—The Argus prints a second letter from the attorney general of Nova Scotia, Hon. J. W. Longley, on "the fishery difficulty and associate subjects." He reiterates his assertion that ill-feeling, engendered by the revolutionary war, is at the bottom of the trouble so far as the United States was concerned, but denies that Canada entertains ill-feeling. He advises the adoption of General Butterworth's bill, and says Great Britain would not be injured by commercial union, nor would it object to it when it found the people of Canada wanted it.

He says the United States should take initiatory steps, and that the Canadian government will quickly respond or be swept out of existence and another government elected that will give effect to the popular will.
