ELECTRIC RAPLWAY.

Stratford is talking of an electric strect railway, like those at Windsor and St. Catharines. The steam power for two cars at Windsor costs \$4 per day; waterpower for six cars at St. Catharines costs \$3 per day. Why not abolish the horses and have it in Kingston, purchasing the power from the electric light company. A five minute service could be had with the present number of cars in use, and then folks could get a car when they wanted it, without waiting as long as their journey would take.

REVELATIONS IN MONTREAL.

The revelations in connection with the Fahey-Naegele-Bureau crimes in Montreal are absolutely astounding. To have connected the first of the trio, without evidence, with burglaries and robberies and arsons would have been to arouse the public indignation, since the people would not have believed it; but the evidence appears to be direct, and if it has the destined effect great will be the reckoning against the offenders. They are, of course, innocent until proven guilty, but, as the Montreal Herald remarks, "a charge like that preferred, as made against members of the police ferce, is in itself sufficiently serious. They have enjoyed public confidence, and have been looked upon as trusted guardians of life and property, and yet, if the charges be true, they have been criminally treacherous and faithless to the trust reposed in them. Under the circumstances the people can hardly be blamed should they ask themselves if there is any more villainy of the kind charged remaining to be unmasked. This is a very serious matter to the citizens of Montreal." The police force is not attacked, but it will be scrutinized, and the scare given the council may have the effect of basing appointments to it in future upon merit and character rather than personal favouritism.

## CANADA'S DEBT.

Mr. Frederick G. Mather, in a letter to The American, discusses Canada's debt, and shows that during only two of the past twenty years has there been a decrease of it, and that the total decrease of it was on ly two millions. On the other hand during eighteen years there was a constant increase, so that the total was one hundred and fifty millions, or a net increase of one hundred and sixty-nine millions, which, ad ded to the original seventy-six millions makes the present total of two hundred and twenty-five millions. The public debt of Canada at the time of confederation was \$22 per capita; at the end of twenty years it was \$45 per capita. In comparison it is stated that the public debt of the United States, when it was at its highest figure, in 1886, was \$88 per capita; at the present time it is \$25 per capita. In Great Britain

the public debt is \$95 per capita. The debt of Canada is thus discoursed upon with a certain object in view -- of reviving a matter which to some is possessed of significance. It is pointed out that Canada may be favoured by rapid development, but' that if that development comes as slowly in the future as it has come in the past no one who has watched the history and growth of public debts can speak with any degree of cheerfulness regarding the prospects of the dominion. And then Mr. Mather gets in the rap for which he was paving the way,

"For many years; during the highest figures of the public debt of the United States, the Canadians looked upon annexation as a most impracticable thing, because they did not wish to pay their share of the immense debt of the United States. But now the conditions are quite reversed. The United States has so reduced the public debt that it is now, per capita, just where the dominion of Canada was at the time it was formed. During the succeeding twenty years, however, the Canadians have managed to double their public debt for every man, woman, and child in the dominion. The outlook, therefore, is that the Canadians may yet wish annexation to save themselves from utter bankruptcy. The time may come when they will wish that they had taken advantage of the proposition of General Banks, suggested to congress in 1865, that the United States should assume Canada's debt to the amount of eighty-five millions; guaranteeing ten millions to the Hudson Bay company; appropriating fifty millions to the completion of the St. Lawrence canals, and two millions for the Inter-Colonial railway in the same manner that the Northern Pacific railway had been assisted by the law of 1862. It is safe to say that, in the existing circumstances, no such liberal proposition, looking toward annexation, will again come to the Canadians for many years. - FREDERICK G. MATHER.

The annexationists, of which it is said there are a few in Canada, will be specially interested in the above.
