

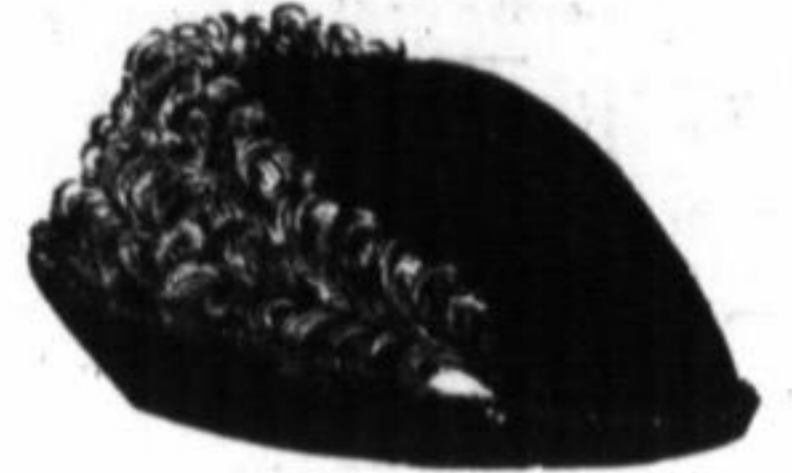

LETTER TO THE EDITOR.

Scott Act in Frontenac.

KINGSTON, Dec. 13.—(To the Editor): The wishes of a majority of the Frontenac county council proved rather to the thought that the Scott act is illegal.

The attitude of the county council towards the Scott act gave aid and comfort to every violator of the law in the county. Men proclaimed, and no doubt believed, that because the council refused to recommend the appointment of a magistrate the act was illegal, and the traders, whose profits are won at the cost of demoralization and crime, found it easy to lure to perjury, when they could point to the refusal of the council to enforce the law.

A little information of a financial character will not come amiss to those who are not besotted or whose pecuniary interests do not lie with the whisky trade. These cannot be supposed to accept as true the carefully gathered statistics which show the beneficial operation of the Scott act.

More Ontario Litigation.

BATERSEA, Dec. 13.—(To the Editor): In your last issue I see the committee on finance have decided to abandon the suit with the Ontario government, in opposition to the claim for expenses of the Scott act.
