

CHEESE MARKETS.

MONTREAL, Dec. 12. - The exports to date were 17,005 boxes, of which 9,342, were on through shipment, against 30,816 in 1886, 19,833 in 1885, and 33,911 in 1884. The market has continued quiet, but it is reported that sales have been made at 10% to 10 ic in the west for finest goods. Foreign advices were no better, and cables report that there is too much early high-priced stock over there, which necessarily restricts demand for the fall make. The cable was

unchanged at 58s. OGDENSBURG, N.Y., Dec. 12.-Two thousand boxes cheese sold, and all are now said to be sold and shipped. Sales were : August, September and October, 1,500 at 11%c; balance at 11c. The cheese business is closed

LITTLE FALLS, N. Y., Dec. 14-Themarket remains about the same as a week ago. Prices are unchanged and nearly as much cheese changed hands. There was very little of what could be called fine goods, most being skimmed stock. There were four lots sold at 9c., sixteen lots at 10c., two lots at 101c., one lot at 101c., three lots at 11c., and twelve lots were consigned. The total transactions amounted to 3,013 boxes. In addition to this there were 227 boxes farm cheese sold at Sc. to 101c., the most at 101c. Fifty-seven packages of farm butter sold at 18c, to 20c., latter being the rulling price.

### IMPORTANT JUDICIAL DECISION.

London, Dec. 14.-The Times, in its financial article, says: "Justice Manisty's decision, that American railroad share certiticates are not negotiable, like bonds, to bearer, has created great interest on the stock exchange. Some banks have intimated to their customers a desire to have a reform of the present system, so that they may not hold stolen certificates, which are liable to be claimed by their owners.

### AN HOSPITAL ENQUIRY

And What It Led to A Farmer Relieved of Serlous Responsibility.

Mr. Wallace, of the Marchmont Home, Belleville, was in the city to-day investigating the case of the boy Eadie, lying in the general hospital, who claimed to have his thigh fractured from a kick by the farmer with whom he was employed The boy's statement has already appeared in the WHIG Mr. Wallace states that the boy was placed seventeen months ago with the farmer at Lansdowne, and that about a month ago a letter came from Rev. Mr. Millard, of that section, stating the story that the farmer having kicked the boy and that he was in such a bad state that he should be removed at once. Therefore he was taken back to the Marchmont home in Belleville. He was very emaciated and attended for a week by Dr. Eakins, of Belleville, when the boy's removal to the Kingston hospital was determined upon. The farmer accompanied Mr. Wallace to this office to day and denied that he had kicked the boy. He was chastising him when he fell against the stove. Mr. Wallace thought that he should pay all expenses of the boy's ill ness and removal as he had been placed strong and well in the farmer's care. But to this he demurred. However, he was willing to pay a fair share of them. Both Mr. Wallace and the farmer said that Eadie was unreliable in his statements, and the shadow has been lifted from the case to a very large extent by an examination, which was made to-day by the physicians of the hospital, who re port that there is no fracture, but that it is a case of hip joint disease. There is reason to feel satisfied that the authorities of the home and farmer have given the case a thorough sifting.

## THE COUNTY COURT.

The Cases Considered So Far - A Horse Killed on the Railway.

At the county court the following cases

have been disposed of : Rutledge v. Freeman-An action to recover damages for loss sustained by fire, started on defendant's land in the township of Loughboro. The defence brought up the question of land title, when counsel and judge decided that the case should be dealt with at a higher court. The matter was referred to the high court of justice.

Bombadier McTier, charged with beastiality, was dismissed because of lack of evidence. Macdonell vs. K. & P. RR.—The plaintiff, who lives near Jackson's Mill, sued for one of his horses, struck by a K. & P. RR. loco-

motive and killed. Macdonell claimed \$150 damages on the ground that the fences, put up by the K. & P.R. company, were not of the proper heighth. Owing to recent legislation, re garding the rights of railroad companies, the plaintiff could not make a case. It was compromised, the defendants agreeing to pay Macdonell \$75, the sum promised before

the case was brought in. The court adjourned until 9:30 a,m. to-
