OUR SPORTING COLUMN. Engagement of Some Noted Ball Players - Items of General Interest. Buffalo has seven catchers in his list. It is not unlikely that the Metropolitan association will be transferred to Troy. A team of colored ball players has been organized for a trip to California. Manager Powers, London, has signed Kelly, Albany, N. Y., a good all-round player. Gilman, the baseball player who was so popular here, will play with the Columbus, Ohio, team next season. Manager Foster has sold the franchise of the Minneapolis baseball team to W. E. Gooding for \$7,000. Pitcher Morris has signed with the Pittsburghs. The consideration, \$2,000, somewhat less than that given him last year. Jim Davis, the big third baseman of the Baltimore club, has signed a contract to play with the St. Louis club. Jack Nelson, formerly of the Metropolitan and New York clubs, has signed with the Buffalo. He will be placed either at third base or short stop. Pfeiffer, Clarkson, and Sunday are all that remain of the Chicago club who have not been signed. It is understood that Sunday is being held off for the chance of a sale or trade. There is very little doubt now that some of the big league reserves will play in London next season, as Manager Powers, who has gone to Philadelphia and Baltimore, has had these men offered to him. Stock amounting to \$15,000 is moving off rapidly.

Miscellaneous Sports. Larry Donovan will jump from the Suspension bridge at Clifton the week of the Smith-Kilrain fight. Dwyre Bros. have secured Tea Tray, at the sale of Congressman W. L. Scott's stable, for \$10,500. Torchlight brought \$7,600 and Satan \$5,100. The prize fight between Kilrain and Smith is supposed to be progressing to-day in the vicinity of Rouen. The referee reserves his decision until he arrives in England. Messenger Chief, a noted trotting stallion, died from rupture at Versailles, Ky. Messenger Chief was owned by George A. Sengerly, of Philadelphia, who paid \$16,000 for him and valued him at \$20,000. The yearling colt by Spendthrift, dam Phyllis, which was sold at the sale of the Spendthrift yearlings early in October to E. H. Garrison ("The Snapper") for \$2,400, died at Sheephead Bay from pneumonia. Particulars of the will of the late George Fordham, the English turfman, have been published, from which it is gathered that "The Demon" died possessed of only one tithe of the wealth he formerly owned before his losses with M. Lefevre. The estate hardly amounts to £20,000.
