





DEATH OF CHARLES JAMES.

An Eyent in Napanee that caused a Great Amount of Sorrow.

Napance has suffered a great loss in the death of Charles James, clerk of the first division court, which event took place on Monday. Mr. James had been ailing, but up to Saturday was thought to be recovering. On Thursday of last week Mr. James was able to be down street. Deceased was born in Lanark, in 1827. At the age of fifteen he was converted and became a member of the Methodist church, continuing therein until his death.

About forty years ago Mr. James engaged in mercantile pursuits at Bath. Shortly afterwards he removed to Napanee, where he has since resided. In 1856 the office of clerk of the division court became vacant and he received the appointment. Mr. James filled themayoralty chair for two years, 1882 and

For thirty years he was connected with the school board, either as member or secretary.

Deceased was thrice married, first to Matilda, daughter of the late George Detlor; second to Ellen Canniff, daughter of Abram A. Canniff, of Canniffton, and lastly to Maria, daughter of the late William Caton, his widow. Two sons and two daughters survive him. Mr. James was a member of Argyle lodge, No. 212, I. O. O. F., as well as a member of the local lodge of A. F. and A. M. Upwards of \$5,000 life insurance was held by deceased.

The funeral on Tuesday was the most impressive ever held in Napanee. The church was suitably draped in black, and the vast congregation assembled testified to the popularity and high moral and christian worth of the deceased.

A NOVELTY IN HOTEL HEATING

Mr. Dunham, Balmoral Hotel, Devises a Improvement in Steam-Heaters.

Montreal Herald. Heretofore the steam-heating apparatus of the Balmo: al hotel has given anything but satisfaction to the proprietors and guests. When steam was wanted in any one room it could not be given except by turning it on in all the rooms in that section of the house. This was accompanied by such a terrified cracking that guests were often awakened at most untimely hours. For a long time Mr. Dunham has been trying to devise a remedy for these evils, and that he has admirably succeeded was conclusively proven to a Herald representative. Mr. Dunham's contrivance is a sort of reservoir placed in each hall-way, and from this runs a separate steam-pipe to each room in the hall. Each of these pipes has a cut-off affixed, and when a guest wishes more heat all that has to be done is to communicate with the office, and the steam is let into his room by the turning of the tap and without the slightest noise or the possibility of overheating the other rooms. There is also an automatic regulator attached, which regulates the quantity of steam entering it. All the halls on the west side of the hotel have been fitted up with this new and unique apparatus, and the other portions of the house are being supplied as rapidly as possible. The new system is certainly a vast improvement over the old method, and proves that the management of the Balmoral is fully alive to looking after the comfort of their guests.

How Mr. Pyne Receives Visitors.

When anybody approaches Lisfinney castle, Mr. Pyne, M. P., who is there in a state of siege, peers forth from one of the turrets of his fortress, and, like Capt. Cuttle, "takes an observation." If it be a friend whom he wishes to meet, his companions inside the tower run out a spar from an angle of the castle wall. Attached to the spar is a double pulley fitted with a long, strong rope, at the end of which a chair is suspended. In this the honorable member seats himself, is swung off, and lowered by some defenders of the castle who are sharing Mr. Pyne's fortunes during the siege, and lowered to the ground from a distance of eighty-six feet. He enters the castle again by the same means.-Chicago Times.

ASTHMA, BRONCHITIS.

Reviving Persons Apparently Dead.

At a meeting of the last congress of German scientists this subject was discussed, and Dr. H. Frank mentioned that there are but two ways to stimulate the heart-electricity and mechanical conc sion of the heart. The first is considered dangerous by him, as it may easily destroy the last power of contraction remaining in the organ. But what is termed "pectoral concussion" is decidedly preferable. Dr. F.'s method is as follows: He flexes the hands on the wrist to an ob-

tuse angle, places them both near each other in the ileo-caecal region, and makes vigorous strokes in the direction of the heart and of the diaphragm. These strokes are repeated from fifteen to twenty times, and are succeeded by a pause, during which he strikes the chest over the heart repeatedly with the palm of his hand. In favorable cases this method is early successful, and sometimes a twitching of the lids or the angles of the mouth appears, with surprising rapidity as the first sign of returning life. As soon as the symptoms are noted, the simple manipulations above described must be earnestly continued and persevered in from half an hour to one hour, for, with their cessation, the phenomena indicating beginning return of life also cease. Generally the face assumes a slight reddish tint, and at the same time a faint pulsation may be felt in the carotids. By this method Dr. F. has seen life return in fourteen cases, among whom were such as had hung themselves, drowned and asphyxiated by carbonic oxide, and in one case by croup. In three cases of asphyxia by coal gas and in one case of apparent death by chloroform the method described alone succeeded. - Medical and Surgical Reporter.
