

I met him in Washington and saw him as he paced the corridor of Willard's hotel, arm in arm with William H. Seward, then secretary of state, he ambitious for a colonel's commission in the regular army, and at the same time an applicant for assistant secretary of the war department, a post which Mr. Lincoln recommended him to Simon Imeron. Shortly after that when his regiment, the New York Fire Zouaves, was quartered in the house of representatives, Willard's hotel caught fire. Word was sent along Pennsylvania avenue that the old time hostelry was doomed.

In less time than it takes to tell it Ellsworth and his men were on the street rushing pell mell, in regular fire laddie style, down the broad thoroughfare until they reached the blazing building. On the roof, in the cellar, on every floor, climbing along the gutter, mounting the chimney, dangling from windows, in every possible place appeared these wild, mad men, determined not only to do their devoir, but to enjoy themselves while they were at it. Ellsworth stood with Gen. Mansfield on the corner, his arms folded, his cap pulled firmly down to his eyebrows, his hair, a beautiful chestnut brown, touching his very shoulder blades. The fire was speedthe side of the hotel, and stood by the veteran commander, while he thanked the assembled Zouaves for their quick and helpful service, predicting he hoped equally efficient work in a more patriotic if not more exciting field .-Joe Howard in New York Graphic.
