THE NEWS FROM EUROPE.

> The Sentence of Mr. Wilfred Blunt Coufirmed-The Imperial Parliament-The Crown Prince-British Imports and

Exports-The Victoria Jubilee Fund. LONDON, Jan. 7.- The sentence of two months' in prisonment in the case of Sir Wilfred Blunt, who had been arrested and convicted on a charge of violating the Crimes

Act by addressing a meeting at Woodford, Ireland, was confirmed in appeal to-day. Judge Henn, before whom the appeal was heard, declared that although Mr. Blunt had not acted wisely, he had shown no cowardice. Immediately after the decision in Mr. Blunt's case he was conveyed to the jail. He

was followed by a large crowd, whom the police attempted to askid by a ruse. This proved futile and a conflict occurred between the crowd and the police, during which swords and batons were used. Several persons were injured. Mr. William John Lane, member of Parlia-

ment for the East Division of Cork, has been arrested in Cork on the charge of making a seditious speceh at Watergrass Hill on Dec. 4. He was admitted to bail.

Professor Virchow of Berlin states in his new work that cancer can be cured.

The steamer Swansea from Baltimore for London, sunk a trawler off Start Point in a collision. Four of the trawler's crew were drowned.

Kaltenbach, the Paris copper operator, who failed yesterday, will pay 30 per cent, cash and 35 per cent. in three months,

The calm prevailing at the present moment is known by official and diplomatic circles to be deceptive, and nobody attaches the slightest importance to the assurances of peace exchanged between the Austrian and Russian Governments, The active resumption of negotiations between Count Kalnoky, the Austrian Foreign Minister, and Prince Lobanoff, the Russian Ambassador at Vienna, for the settlement of the balance of power for the Balkan peninsula, is the only actual change tending toward peace. This removes the danger of war for the present, but does not modify any of the essential differences between the two governments.

The attitude of England in the event of hostilities will be one of freen ily neutrality. This fact is known to the Berlin Foreign Office. No overtures have ever been made to the German Government for England's co-operation in the triple alliance. The Cologne Gazette's article urging the advantage to England of joining the alliance was without official inspiration, What official inspiration reaches Berlin on the position of England is derived from London and St. Petersburg. The Czar has obtained the assurance that England has not joined the alliance. The Moscow Gazette to-day emphasizes the wisdom of England abstaining from any coalition with the central European powers. It says that she should rather conciliate Russia, in order to remain in peaceful possession of India. A Pan-Slavist organ seeks to show that Lord Salisbury's friendly neutrality is associated with sympathy for Bismarck's policy; and says that the evolution of events may soon convert this sympathy into active co-operation with the alliance.

Rumors that the Kaiser was seriously ill were current yesterday, but they were emphatically denied by officials doing business at the palace, Count Herbert Bismarck had a long interview with the Emperor to-day, and Col. Brix presented him the first imprint of the army list for 1888. During the interview the Emperor chatted cheerfully.

The imports to England for the past month increased £3, 162,685 as compared with the corresponding month in 1886. The exports of the same month increased £3,230,000 over those of December, 1886.

The post-morten examination made of the body of McNeill, the reporter who went to France to report the Kilrain-Smith fight and who was found dead on the beach at Boulogne, revealed the fact that he met his death by foul play. It was ascertained that he had been thrown into the water while he was yet alive, though in an unconscious condition.

An institution is to be founded in England for training and maintaining nurses for the sick poor in their own homes. The centre of the institution is to be in London, with branches at Edinburgh and Dublin.

LONDON, Jan. 8.-Judge O'Hagan differed from his brother Land Commissioners, Litton and Wrench, in respect to the famous rent reduction edict, not because he thought it went too far in giving discretionary powers to the Land Commission to make abatements, but not far enough. He thought the act gave greater powers in this respect than his colleagues would use. I believe what the Parnellites complain of is that the reductions are made dependent on the prices of produce. Now prices vary according to scarcity; thus the farmer may get less for the entire produce of the farm when prices are high than when low. The Times to-day gives prominence to a letter from a correspondent, who alleges that he knows a man who will not pay his rent who has £700 in gold under the floor of his cabin. "His cabin," says The Times," is literally paved with gold,"

No mention of Stanley was made in despatches received at Brussels from the Cougo country up to Dec. 10.

Discount was easy in London during the past week at 2 and 11. The more peaceful aspect of the political situation made foreign securities strong. American railroad securities generally were not changed.

A despatch from Bucharest says that the Russian reserves in Odessa have been dismissed.

A concession of territory has been made to Spain by Italy, for fifteen years, of territory on the Bay of Assal, suitable for a coaling station. The latter, honever, has reserved the right to use it herself to the exclusion of others in time of war.

Two thousand Spanish pilgrims were received by the Pope to-day. He afterwards gave an audience to Emperor William's Envoy, to whom he expressed the great pleasure with which he regarded the latest proof of the affection of the Emperor and the excellent re lations between Germany and the Vatican.
