

THE POPE AND IRELAND.

HIS HOLINESS WILLING TO ACT AS MEDIATOR BETWEEN MEN.

He Demands a Moderate Measure of Home Rule, and Advises the Tories to Take the Wind Out of Mr. Gladstone's Sails by

Adopting His Programme. LONDON, Jan. 17 .- The Pope's action on English politics has never been more eagerly watched than at present. L'Univers, which, since the death of M. Veuillot, has lost much of its old influence as a Catholic organ, but is still believed occasionally to be inspired from the vatican, says the Pope promises the English government that he will on certain conditions mediate between England and Ireland now that he has learned the state of Ireland through Mgr. Persico's report. He demands the concession of a moderate measure of home rule, a local parliament to legislate on Irish affairs, and a compromise respecting the limits of its authority. The Pope advises the tories to take the wind out of Mr. Gladstone's sails by adopting the general principles of his programme, and thus secure the adhesion of the Irish Catholic clergy. This, if true, proves what the Irish members always allege, viz., that the pope dares not openly oppose the national movement in Ireland, and also shows that no modus vivendi is possible at present with the tories, as a necessary condition of a large part of the support they receive or the denunciation of Mr. Parnell.

The Outbreak of Small-Pox.

London, Jan. 17.-In Sheffield is the most serious outbreak of small-pox in recent years. The hospital accommodation is ut terly insufficient. Up to Christmas there were 2,728 cases and 277 deaths. The figures showing the vaccinated and unvaccinated are instructive. The unvaccinated who are necessarily a small minority of the population, contributed 2,198 cases and the vaccinated, forming the larger majority of the population, only 282, with the remaining cases doubtful. This will be a severe blow to the anti-vaccinationists, who, since the suppression of the outbreak at Leicester, where the compulsory vaccination act is largely disregarded, have shown increased activity in their agitation.

DEATH OF REV. MR. MURRAY.

A Graduate of Queen's University Dies from Sunstroke in India.

While the foreign mission committee of the Presbyterian church in Canada was in session in Toronto yesterday a cablegram was received from India, stating that the Rev. R. C. Murray, missionary at Ujjain, had died from the effects of a sunstroke. Mr. Murray was sent out to India about two years ago, and was supported by the congregation of St. Paul's church, Montreal. Mrs. Murray died less than two months ago.

This announcement will be received by many Kingstonians with feelings of sincere sorrow. The deceased clergyman was well known here, having spent seven years at Queen's university. He was a native of the lower provinces, and induced to come to Kingston and study for the ministry. When he graduated in arts he went through the theological hall. He was a young man of brilliant attainments, of genial disposition, and as companionable as any one could desire. He was very much attached to friends here, and it was with sincere regret that he brought himself to leave the city and attend to duty in India. He wrote cheerfully from that land, but the death of his wife, after a few months of married life, left him lonely, and his demise now makes the circumstances sadder.

A MINE EXPLOSION.

Hundreds of Acres Still on Fire-Serious Danger of It Spreading.

Glasgow, N.S., Jan. 17 .- Thirteen men. are congratulating themselves over their hairbreadth escape from certain death at the explosion in the Albion mine. Mr. Poole says the volume of flame which came out of the slope at the first explosion was tremendous and completely enveloped the bank house, which is one hundred and fifty long, in its fiery embrace. The loss will be heavy, there being no insurance on the surface buildings. One hundred and fifty men are thrown out of employment. It is fearful to contemplate the destruction which must follow the explosion, as it will be impossible to put out the fire in the mine on account of the scarcity of water, and the pit will be left to its fate. It is only a matter of time when there must be a sea of fire raging in the heart of the earth. The following mines are now connected with each other: Cage pit, abandoned and on fire; Dalhousie pit, the same; Foster pit, the same; Ford pit, now being pumped out, and the new Albion mines, fired by the late explosion. These spread over hundreds of acres of ground, and when the fires in the several mines unite it may make a serious change in the geographical aspect of Pictou county.

WILFRED BLUNT'S CHARGE.

How Mr. Balfour Would Crush the Irish Agitation-Another Statement.

London, Jan. 17. - Mr. Wilfred Blunt's charge that Mr. Balfour said to him person; ally last autumn that he would crush the Irish agitation by imprisoning half a dozen Irish leaders who are the weakest physically and most likely to die under the hardship probably needs qualifications. What Mr. Balfour used to say during the session was that if the Irish leaders were given plank beds and skilly diet there would be an end to the whole nationalist trouble, and when his friends pointed out that such treatment would be likely to kill a man like Mr. Dillon, he said that that doubtless would be a misfortune, but that the imperial policy could not be altered on that account.



Is a European War.

In view of the strong probability of a European war, in which Austria will play a leading part, it will be of interest to learn something of the men in whose hands Austria in such a case would place the command of her armies. One of her most famous and efficient soldiers is Duke Albrecht, who has served the empire in a military capacity for more than sixty years, a fact which was not long ago celebrated by a jubilee. Duke Albrecht is the son of the victor of Aspern, and received his military education under the supervision of his renowned father. the age of 14 he entered the army, in which he rose from rank to rank. As early as 1845 he was a commanding general. He has taken an important part in many engagements, as, for instance, in the battles of Mortara and Novasra, where his action helped gain the victory for the Austrian arms. The chief victory of his life, however, was that of Custozza, in 1866, when he signally defeated the Italians. The reader will remember that Austria at that time was compelled to fight two enemies at once, the Prussians in the north and the Italians in the south. While victorious over the latter, Austria, owing to the incompetence of her generals, was vanquished by her northern foe. But not only on the battle field has Duke Albrecht acquired renown and distinction; he is also the great reorganizer of the Austrian army, which, through his exertions and vigilance, has now reached a state of great efficiency. Duke Albrecht is Austria's field marshal, occupying a position analogous to the one of Von Moltke in the German army. He is also known as an able writer on military topics.

STERNECK. Another soldier who has taken an active part in a number of campaigns is Freiherr Von Beck, who, though born in Breisgau, in Germany, has been an officer in the Austrian army since 1848. He, too, played a conspicuous part in the reorganization of the latter and is a great favorite of emperor Francis Joseph. Ha is chief of the general staff of the Austrian army.

VCN BECK.

Freiherr von Rheinlander has won much renown as a writer on military topics, and has also distinguished himself on the battlefield. He is said to be the soul of the general staff.

Another man of importance is Freiherr von Sterneck, under whose superintendence Austria's navy has reached a state of perfecstion surprising for the short time in which it has been accomplished. It was Sterneck, who, in the memorable naval battle of Lissa, vanquished the Italian fleet, and it was his vessel that sunk the powerful Re d' Italia.

TOM CONNEFF.

The Champion Distance Runner of Ire-

land and the North of Englan!. Now comes to America more bone and muscle in the person of E. T. Conneff, champion distance runner of Ireland and the north of England. He comes to make America his home. Conneff is 19 years of age and was born in County Kildare, Ireland. He ran his first race in June, 1885, and since then has met with a continuous succession of victories on the cinder path. In 1886 he beat E. C. Carter in a two mile race; time, 9 minutes 44 3-5 seconds. This race was thus described in an English sporting paper:

"Carter came to Europe some three months ago to win for the land of the Stars and Stripes the four miles and ten miles champi-

onships of England. In both these big undertakings he was signally successful. He simply whipped the Saxon as Jem Smith could whip a babe, and the cable was quickly put in motion to tell his friends at home that the Union Jack had been lowered in two of the most important events on the championship programme. Carter then rested a while, and on Aug. 1 we found

him at Manchester ready to capture the championship of the north of TOM CONNEFF. England at two miles. But there was also in the field a Richmond from Ireland. This was young Tommy Conness, frail-not to say fragilelithe and delicate looking, small-not to say diminutive—and just half way through his nineteenth year.
