#### STUDIOUS CADETS NEEDED.

The Adjutant-General Offers a Few Obser-

vations Touching the R. M. C. Speaking with reference to the June exminations for cadetships in the Royal mililary college Adjutant-General Powell says that although the examinations are open to every young Canadian of the required age there are promotion examinations each year waich, if a cadet fails to pass, he cannot ret in his place. 'He, therefore, considers only those who are in earnest for duty and study should seek cadetships, they being the only o ies likely to maintain 'their position while i college or to graduate from it with credit at the ead of their four years' course. Col. Powell says he is thoroughly in accord with Major-General Oliver's views that graduation at the Royal military college should be allowed to count for one or two years in our arts course at a university .The government has practically conceded this principle by inserting a clause in the Dominion lands act of 1886, whereby graduates of the military college, desiring to become Dominion nd surveyors, and having gone through tie proper course of surveying in the colge, were entitled to have two years de ducted from their course of study as Dominion land surveyors.

Shown a copy of the Mail in which comments reflecting somewhat upon the ase ulness of the contege were made, the adjutant general said : "I think it one of the most beneficial establishments that has been organized by the dominion government. The results from it are perhaps more apparent to me than to many persons outside the department, because I have been more or less identified with the college since its foundation. It was never intended that the education should be purely military. From the outset it was understood that many of the graduates would devote their attention to civil pursuits, but a was apparent to the department that all the graduates would possess military knowledge which would be of the greatest possible use in cases of necessity. Whether the graduate embarked in civil or military pursuits would make little difference as to his ultimate usefulness Under all circumstances, if employed in the country, he would be enlarging his understanding and obtaining practical ideas on almost every subject needmilitary administrations. In n.y op nion there oud be no more satisfactory means of conveying the higher mulitary know edge needful in Canada than through the military college which has been established. The education, both military and civil, and the physical training is all that could be desired under our present circumstances. In addition to their military education all the graduates from their training are amenable to discipline, and have a proper respect for law and authority. The results from a similar system of education in a neighboring country has shown that many most excellent officers who did service in the military branches of the army, had, from a want of military employment in more peaceful times, engaged in other pofessions. But when officers were needed they immediately volunteered for duty. Although the graduates when at once employed for military service are most useful it seems to me that young men possersing such an education as the graduates have will be most valuable property Canada can own. The college has only been in operation eleven years. We have already a fair proportion in the army and in the Dominion military service, and many of those who are following civil pursuits are developing into most useful men. The graduates of the college are now to be found in almost every pursuit in life, even including that of a clergyman, the only instance I am aware of. I think the gentleman in question well fitted for military duty and, whenever needed, I feel sure his service will be placed at the disposa! of the dominion. Physically he was a most excellent specimen of manhood when he left college. He passed with honors, which answers his military qualifications, and his example and influence as a clergyman will be no detriment to him as a graduate."

#### TWO COASTING ACCIDENTS.

Fatal Collision in Oswego-Seven Persons Injured in Haverhill, Mass.

Oswego, N.Y., Jan. 18. -Benjamin Sawver, one of the young men injured in a coasting accident on Saturday evening, is dead, and one or two others are liable to die. There were ten persons on the bobs. The hill is very steep and one mass of ice, and they were running at least seventy five miles an hour. Near the bottom of the hill they ran into a heavy load of timber, knocking it into the ditch. Every person on the bobs was rendered insensible from the force of the collision, and some were horribly cut and mangled. Sawyer, who died, did not regain consciousness. Both hips were broken and the bones driven into the abdomen. He was married on New Year's day. It required one hundred stitches to sew up the cuts in John Mattet's ab lomen, and his arm was broken and head cut. George Sawyer, brother of the dead man, has a fractured skull. The city council set aside the hill where the accident occurred for coasting. The farmer who owned the load of timber was warned of the approach of the bobs, but refused to stop for a moment. It is said he was intoxicated.

HAVERHILL, Mass., Jan. 18. - A frightful accident happened last evening to a party of boys who were coasting on Peeker's hill on a double-ripper. 
