Potatoes remained easy at \$1.05 to \$1.15 per bag. Any amount of lard could be purchased at 9c and 10c per pound. The hay market was lively, prices were a little lower, timothy brought \$14, clover \$11, straw

Dairy products were much easier to-day than they have been for some time. Hogs were also easy and could be bought as low as \$6.80. Chickens were scarce. One load sold at 65c a pair. Retail prices in general did not

TAINTY OF PERMAN NT PEACE.

German Opinion Russian Influence in Butgaria-War Only Delayed, Not Averted Roumania's Attitude.

LONDON, Jan. 22. - The war scare in Vienna and Berlin is slightly abated just at present. but official circles remain confident that an open rupture of the Central European powers with Russia cannot long be avoided. The attitude of Roumania creates a suspicion in Vienna that her intention really is, while pretending to maintain a position of neutrality between the prospective combatants, to assist Russia in her schemes in the Balkans at the proper moment. The Roumanian Minister of Public Instruction and Arts, M. D. Stourdza, is now in Berlin, whither he is gone to offer explanations to the German Government of the attitude of Roumania, as betrayed by her recent actions, In the meantime the movements of the Roumanian troops up to date are all in favor of the Czar's convenience in case of active war. At the Austrian Foreign Office the action of Roumania is consulèred to be a concerted plan with the Russian campaign, and the result is anything but confidence in the professions of neutrality, which the Roumanian Ministersdo not cease to make. It is believed that Roumania has accepted Russia's terms for an alliance, and is pursuing this course in fulfillment of a formal agreement.

Since the clear comparison of the relative strength of the frontier forces of Germany and Russia, given by The Military Wochenblatt, the official organ of the German army, nothing more definite has been ascertained than the semi-official statement yesterday, that in spite of the arrival of additional Russian troops on the frontier, Germany for the present will not order the counter movement needed to equalize the strength of the two forces. Germany's attitude of expectancy is justified by the reports to the War Office touching the breaking down of the Russian transport service, the waste of munitions, the defective commissariat and starvation and disease in the Russian army. On the Russian side the war party has modified its tone, owing to the discovery that an early effective campaign is an utter impossibility.

The Moscow Gazette yesterday indicated the pacific policy of Russia. It declared that peace was assured unless Russia should be provoked by aggressive acts of her neighbors. The Novoe Vremya protests that the Russian armaments are purely defensive. The Svet disputes The Wochenblatt's figures, and tries to prove that Germany can concentrate 1,000, -000 men on the frontier of Poland within ten days, while Russia's huge areas of territory and imperfect means of transportation render difficult the work of mobilization. The postponement of the rupture is not in accordance with the strategy of the Berlin office, nor within the wishes of the Viennese, but continues due to the irresolution of the Austrian Government. Although convinced that war is inevitable and that it would be preferable for Austria sooner or later, Count Kalnoky persists in waiting Russia's time. Public sentiment in Vienna and Pesth displays irritation over the position. The Hungarian papers charge Kalnoky with too great subservience to Bismarck, and urge that action be taken without waiting for an order from Berlin. The truth of the position, however, is that Prince Bisnoky of the fact that a German initiative to war is impossible, leaving the Austrian Government free to open hostilities when it deems

the time ripe. Another version is semi-officially issued in Vienna to night of the Russian Military Attache Zujef's recent statement that two new divisions of Russian troops had arrived at the Galician frontier. The first version of this statement, which was also semi-officially given, was distinctly menacing. It is now stated that M. Zujef, while conversing with Austrian officials, only stated that a displacement of divisions would be effected gradually in the course of the present year. He further expressed the hope that no advance would be made, as such a movement would be weakening to Russia's defensive measures. This interpretation is obviously issued to allay the impatience of the military and political circles of Austria-Hungary, where Count Kalnoky is becoming distrusted and plans are maturing to substitute a more energetic Minister. Count Andrassy will supplant Kalnoky ere long if a powerful section of ac-

tive politicians succeed in their plans. The Polish group in Vienna rely on Count Andrassy to assist in the revival of a Polish Kingdom, consisting of Russian and Austrian Poland under an Austrian Prince. The expectancy of the Poles rapidly increases. Their organs in Cracow and Lemberg, while preaching prudence, declare that the people of Poland will go solid for Austria if assured of some form of restored independence. Bishop Dunajenski of Cracow, who is recognized by the Poles as their ecclesiastical leader, has been entreated to assist in the development of a national movement by making a public declaration, but he responds by advising the greatest

reserve until events justify action. The Russian Minister to Roumania, M Hitrovo, declared to-day that Russia would certainly soon regain her influence in Bulgaria, and that the people of that country would again ask Russia to deliver them from the slavery to which they are subjected at the present time.

A sentence of six weeks' imprisonment and a fine of 150 roubles have been imposed on Mr. Feodoroff, the editor of The Novoe Vremya, for having libelled Major Vittaume, military attache of the German Legation at St. Peters-

The Socialists were prevented from holding meeting in Trafalgar-square, London, to-day by the police, who arrested two of them. There was no disorder.

The Paris Bourse was steady during the past week, with limited dealings. The increases include 3 per cent. Rentes, 30 f.; Credit Foncier, 34f., and Suez Canal 15f. Panama Canal shares declined 71f. yesterday, making the fall for the week 35f.

The Berlin Boerse was quiet during the week, with a firm tendency. Prices on the Frankfort Bourse were firm, and there was a rising tendency in foreign
