MUST ACCEPT THE SHARES.

Decision of the Chancery Court in James v. Kerr-A Central Bank Incident,

TORONTO, Feb. 4. The case of Janes v. Kerr was heard by Mr. Justice Ferguson in the Chancery Divisional Court yesterday. Mr. S. H. Janes, through his counsel, Mr. Dalton McCarthy, Q.C., applied for an order to compel Mr. J. K. Kerr, Q.C., to accept sixty-three shares of Central Bank stock in part payment of some property purchased by the plaintiff from the defendant, according to an agreement made before the failure of the Central Bank, The liquidators of the bank were made codefendants. His Lordship's judgment was tothis effect:

This Court doth declare that the plaintiff is entitled to the specific performance of the contract in the pleadings set forth and as one of the terms thereof to the execution by the defendant, James Kirkpatrick Kerr, of an acceptance in the proper book of the said bank of the transfer from the plaintiff to him of 63 shares of the capital stock of the said bank.

And this Court doth order and adjudge that the defendant, James Kirkpatrick Kerr, do forthwith specifically perform the said contract and execute the acceptance of the said

And this Court dot's direct that the defendants, the said liquidators, do place the said defendant, James Kirkpatrick Kerr, upon the list of contributories in the liquilation of the said bank as holder of the said 63 shares of stock, without prejudice, however, to the liability of the plaintiff to be put also on the list of contributories under section 77 of the Banks Act or any other statute in that behalf in respect of the said 63 shares, as if this action had not been brough's

And it is further ordered and adjudged that the said defendant, James Kirkpatrick Kerr, do indemnify and save harmless the plaintiff from all liability in respect of the said 63 shares of

And it is further ordered and adjudged that the defendant, James Kirkpatrick Kerr, do pay to the plaintiff and to the defendants, the said liquidators, their costs of this action forth with after taxation thereof.

PHARMACY COLLEGE'S REGISTRAR.

Mr. J. T. Lewis of Toronto Appointed for Six Months-New Lecture Courses ...

Toponto, Feb. 4.

The Council of the College of Pharmacy finished its work of the first meeting by two sessions yesterday. The principal business of the day was the appointment of a Registrar-Treasurer in place of Mr. Geo. Hodgetts, resigned. The Executive and Financial Committee's report recommending the appointment of Mr. J. T. Lewis of Toronto until the meeting next August was adopted. The other applicants for the position were: F. T. Harrison, Toronto; D. A. White, Woodstock; C. R. Sneath, Penetang; J. T. Pepper, Hamilton; W. Lloyd Wood, Toronto; H. H. Curtis, Kingston.

It was moved by Messrs. Sanders and D'Avignon that expert accountants should be employed to audit the college's books since its inception, with a view to investigating the statements made regarding alleged crookedness in the finances. The motion was lost.

At the afternoon session it was decided to institute two courses of lectures next fall and winter each lasting 25 months and commencing in October. The fees are to be \$40 for the junior and \$60 for the senior class. It was also decided that new diplomas be issued to those who had attended the lectures and passed the final. A committee was appointed to enquire into the expediency of making alterations in the system of conducting the

TOBACCO STOREHOUSES EMPTY.

The Supply Running Short-Excitement Among Kentucky Cultivators.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Feb. 3.—Heavy buyers of tobacco report great excitement in Kentucky. Every available foot of land is being engaged, and people are paying as high as \$90 per acre rent for good fields. A representative of a New York tobacco firm says Spain has recently bought 4000 hogsheads of lugs in New York, which leaves her 1000 short of last year's requirements, with about 18,000 hogsheads for the wants of 1888. The New York warehouses are about empty. Louisville operators are making every effort to get all the dark grades in a few hands, and are credited with the purchase within a week of nearly all the stock in Paducah, Hopkinsville and Nashville.

EXPORT RATES.

Proceedings of the Executive Committee of the Trunk Lines.

NEW YORK, Feb. 3.—At the meeting of the Executive Committee of the trunk lines yesterday it was resolved to maintain the present export rates. It was also decided to ask the Grand Trunk line by wire to return to the old rates. The passenger agents met afterwards, when it was announced that the Canadian Pacific had entered into an agreement with the trunk lines to abolish the payment of commissions on all passenger traffic on all east-bound trains and on all west-bound trains east of Hamilton, on the northern boundary of Maine.

A Seterious Crook.

LONDON, Feb. 3.—Dr. Hamilton, alias Gustavus Griffin, who achieved notoriety as a confidence operator in Toronto and Montreal as well as in this city, has been successfully playing his little game in Los Angeles, Cal., where, as manager of the alleged "Southern California Land Bureau," he induced the unwary to invest money in his wondrous wealthproducing schemes. At last accounts he had been arrested for embezzling about \$1700, but through the eloquent pleading and copious tears of his wife had managed to secure bait for his future appearance in court.

Boy Thieves Uncarthed in Chicago. CHICAGO, Feb. 3.-A large number of recent robberies in the vicinity of Wentworthavenue and Twenty-ninth-street have been explained by the discovery of the headquarters of a gang of boy thieves under a sidewalk. Revolvers in great profusion hung about the papered walls, which were decorated with sensational prints. At the station the boys confessed to complicity in several robberies.

RUSSIA'S LOVE FOR PEACE

DOES NOT PREVENT HER PREPARA-TIONS FOR WAR.

A Speech of Lord Ripon-Mr. Cox's Exelusiveness - Dynamiters Sentenced-Briven to Desperation by Poverty-Italian Troops Entrenching.

LONDON, Feb. 3 .- An article from a wellknown Russian military authority is published in The Novoe Vremya, in which it is charged that The Berlin Militair Wochenblatt is deceiving the German public regarding the positions of Russia and Germany. "An impartial and general elucidation of their true positions," it says, "is desirable in the interests of both nations " It adds:

"The only means of protecting Russia from German or Austrian attack is to increase the defensive power of Russian forts and the number of troops on the frontier and to expand the railway systems. From a military view there must not be regarded merely the narrow area of actually protected frontier, but the whole possible theatre of eventual war. Russia must consider the territory from the western frontier to the Dwina and Duieper, whereas Germany must guard her country from the Russian frontier to the middle course of the Elbe, including Berlin, while Austria must protect the territory extending to the middle course of the Danube, including Vienna and Pesth. The Invalide. Russe correctly pointed out this view.

"Regarding the number of troops on the frontier, if the extent of area be considered, a comparison will give 161 Austrian and German corps against 81 Russian corps,"

The Novoe Vremya prints details of the

Russian frontier armaments and says: "Russi unes not covet an inch of German territory, but will not cede an inch of her own. Russia is animated by a profound love of peace. She will not conceal that she is preparing for defense: So long as Germany remains quiet she will not be menaced with attack from any quarter."

A reception was tendered to Lord Ripon and Mr. Morley in Leinster Hall, Dublin, last evening. Messrs. Davitt, Redmond, Healy, Plimsoll and a large number of Parnellite commoners were present. Lord Ripon addressed the meeting and in the course of his remarks said that the great party of England was on Ireland's side now, and her hopes would soon be crowned with success. He called upon his hearers not to be goaded by violence to commit crine, as it would be the foulest treason to Ireland.

Mr. Morley met with a warm reception, He arraigned the Government, and said its policy was a painful and cruel farce, and had utterly failed to discourage the commission of outrage. Both speakers briefly addressed overflow meetings outside the hall.

Mr. Cox refuses to have any intercourse with his fellow-prisoners. He expects to be removed to Tutlamore Jail.

Thos. Calian and Michael Harkins were found guilty of being connected with a dynamite conspiracy to-day in London. They were sentenced to fifteen years' penal servi-At Manchester to-day a chemist named

Derby and his wife and children have been found dead in their dwelling house. Their death was caused by poison, and they had been dead several days. It is believed that the man, driven to desperation by inability to support his family, gave them poison and then committed suicide.

The Italian troops in Abyssinia are actively entrenching themselves. They are all under canvas, even to the commander. Abyssinian scouts are continually approaching the camp. Miss Mary Howitt, the poetess and novel

ist, is dead at Rome. The leaders of the National Liberals, Centrists and Conservatives held a conference with Bismarck yesterday. He imparted confidential explanations on the political situa-

tion which it was not advisable to reveal to Parliament. Count Kalnoky and Bismarck are continually exchanging telegrams. The Austrian army is completely provided with field guns, but heavy siege ordnance is scarce. Krupp

has probably received orders. Fresh arrivals of Russian troops upon the Russian frontier are recorded by The Berlin Kreuz Zeitung.

Several crofters of the Island of Lewis, who have been on trial for rioting, have been convicted and sentenced some to a year's imprisonment, some to nine months and others

Lord Salisbury was waited on to-day by a deputation of Irish landlords, who urged that they might be compensated for the losses through recent legislation.

When the Imperial Parliament meets, Sir William Vernon Harcourt wi'l open the attack on the Government by offering an am ndment to the address in reply to the Queen's speech, condemning the enforcement of the coercion laws.

Dr. Barnardo of London is preparing his season's emigration work. He intends to take out 200 boys to Canada in March, fifty of whom will be placed in the new Industrial Farm in Manitoba. These fifty are picked lads, each over 17 years of age. The doctor is confident of the success of his enterprise and is already inundated with requests for farm hands from settlers, but is determined that each youth must first undergo one year's training on the industrial farm.

The Registrar in the Bankruptcy Court has made a receiving order in the case of Messra. McMaster of London and Toronto upon the application of Pla-lps, Sedgwick & Biddle. A petition was presented by Mr. James Mc-Master, with the concurrence of his Toronto partner. The liabilities are estimated at £50,000.
