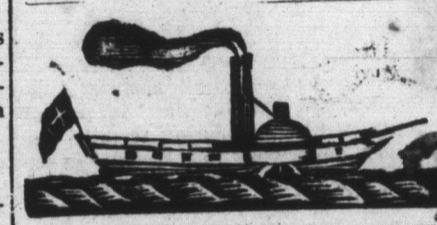

Miscellaneous Articles.

ancient state of Letters in England.
There was a time in England when the
knowledge of letters was so low, that who-
ever could prove himself in a court of
justice able to read a verse in the New
Testament, was vested with the highest
privileges, and a clergyman who knew any
thing of grammar was looked upon as a
prodigy. In those unenlightened days, we
are told, a rector of a parish going to law
with his parishioners about paying the
church, quoted this authority from St. Pe-
ter—"paveant illi, non paveant ego"—
which he interpreted, "they are to pave
the church, not I;" and this was allowed to
be law by a good judge, who was an eccle-
siastic too. Alfred the great complained
towards the end of the ninth century that
from the Humber to the Thames there was
not a priest who understood the liturgy in
the mother tongue; or could translate the
easiest piece of latin. A correspondent
of Abelard about the middle of the twelfth
century complimenting him on the resort
of pupils from all countries, says, that e-
ven Britain, distant as she was, sent her
savages to be instructed by him, "remota
Britannia sua animalia eurdienda destina-
bat." If the clergy then held (as is said to
be the case) all the learning among them-
selves, what a blessed state the laity must
have been! And so indeed it appears, for
there is extant an old act of parliament,
which provides that a nobleman shall be
entitled to the benefit of his clergy, even
although he cannot read. Another law
made by judge Rolls in his abridgment,
sets forth that "the command of the sher-
iff to his officers by word of mouth, and
without writing, is good; for it may hap-
pen that neither sheriff nor his officers
can write or read." Many charters are
extant where persons of great emi-
nence and even kings, have affixed the sign-
ature of a cross, because unable to read or
write. In sum crucis manu propria pro
ignorantibus scribunt. Hence the term of
signature scribunt. These and
many other remarks of a similar descrip-
tion have been adduced to prove the low
ebb of our literature in former times;
but now that the interests of mankind are
the means of promoting their happiness are
better understood, we find times are chang-
ed; and in no instance is that change for
the better more happily felt than in the
fostering care which our government ex-
tends to the promotion of letters and the
diffusion of knowledge.
