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And on all other goods, wares and merchandise, not herein before enumerated, the growth produce or manufacture of the said United States of America, a duty of five pounds on every hundred pounds, and value, of the value of such goods, wares and merchandise as aforesaid. Provided always, that nothing in this act contained, shall extend or be construed to extend, to prevent or in any wise prohibit the importation free from the payment of any duty of the following articles, being the growth, produce or manufacture of the said United States of America, unmanufactured tobacco, staves and heading, wheat, pot and pearl ashes, furs and skins not dressed, pork and live cattle, sheep, hogs and tallow, and the personal baggage, travelling carriage or carriages of any person or persons, subjects or foreigners, who may lawfully come into or reside in this province. Provided always that nothing in this act contained shall extend or be construed to extend to prohibit the admission of flour, oak, pine and fir timber into this province, free of duty, for exportation only.

III And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that from and after the passing of this act, there shall be paid on all vessels or boats, the property of the citizens of the United States of America, coming into any of the ports of this province, the following duties, viz.—on all small vessels above 5 to 50 tons, the tonnage duty of three pence per ton, on all vessels above fifty tons, six pence per ton. Provided always that whenever any ship or vessel, laden as aforesaid, shall arrive at any port or ports of entry or clearance, containing goods, wares, and merchandise as aforesaid, the cargo or load whereof is intended to pass by such port or ports, in order to be transported to Lower Canada, the master or other person having charge or command of such ship or vessel, or the agent or agents for the proprietor or proprietors thereof, shall forthwith on the arrival at any such port or ports of entry as aforesaid, make a report and declaration thereof to the collector or his deputy, stationed at such port or ports of entry, and such declaration shall be verified on oath, and such master or person commanding such vessel or agent or agents for the proprietors, if required, shall and he is hereby required to enter into a bond in double the amount of the tonnage duty imposed by this act, for the payment thereof, should the whole or any part of such goods, wares and merchandise remain in or be unexported from this province. And provided also, that nothing in this act contained shall extend, or be construed to extend to compel the payment of any tonnage duty on vessels exclusively employed for the purpose of transporting passengers and their baggage.

IV. Provided always, and be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that nothing in this act contained shall extend or be construed to extend to authorise the demand of tonnage duty on any such vessel laden exclusively with goods, wares and merchandise in transitu for Lower Canada.

V. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that all monies collected under and by virtue of this act, shall be paid into the hands of the receiver General, and for the uses of his majesty, his heirs and successors, for the uses of this province and towards the support of the government thereof, to be accounted for to his majesty through the lords commissioners of his treasury, for the time being in such manner as it shall please his majesty to direct. Provided always, that nothing in this act contained, shall extend or be construed to extend to affect the provisions of any act of the parliament of Great Britain, for regulating the intercourse of this province with the United States of America.

VI And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that this act shall be in force from and after the passing thereof until the end of the next ensuing session of the Provincial Parliament.

THE PROMPTER.—No. XVII.

I perceive that a premium is proposed by the agricultural society of the Midland District, to encourage the growing of Barley—that is proper. But I see no such encouragement yet offered for the cultivation of Hops; and have felt mortified, for our farmers, to observe this article imported into the province from the States, when our own soil is so peculiarly adapted to it, that a sufficiency might be produced here, with very little care and expence. Hops grow in this country almost spontaneously. In any of our townships, a farmer may easily plant the vines, which will improve from year to year to a considerable number of years. His labour will be amply rewarded. At the same time, he will have the satisfaction of performing an act of patriotism. By supplying our own brewers with this useful article, he will contribute to retain in the province the money which is now carried out of it, to pay for that which is consumed among us. Reader, do you think beer? Then cultivate Hops, as well as barley. If, in this, or any other particular, you neglect the means with which Providence has blessed you, to furnish supplies for our own market, and by such culpable neglect, directly co-operate in sending abroad our circulating medium, in payment of articles necessary domestic consumption, the promoter is bound by a sense of justice, to tell you, that you have no right to complain of the scarcity of money, or to ask for legislative aid. You must first do your duty, as an individual. Put your shoulder to the wheel, in the language of the fable, and whip up your horses; exert all your own means, before you call upon Hercules to help you out of the mire.

By producing a plenty of the raw materials of beer, and thus promoting the manufacture and use of that healthy drink, you will at the same time, contribute to another object, most devoutly desired by the patriot and philanthropist, the gradual disuse of ardent spirits, so pernicious to the health and morals of any people, and of none more than the inhabitants of this province.

Beer, the favourite drink of the English nation, and cider, the national beverage of the Americans, being both of them adapted to this country, should be made here in plenty, from the produce of our own soil, and substituted, in general use, instead of those liquid fires, by which, at present, so many victims of intemperance are habitually consumed.

Europe is in such a state of profound peace that her great men have leisure to amuse themselves in a variety of ways. Some of their diversions are attended with casualties. One of the latest articles of intelligence, from that quarter of the world, is that the King of Prussia had scratched his face, and nearly broken the bridge of his nose, while diverting himself with sliding down an artificial ice-hill, in a sledge, which happening to be overturned in the descent, threw its royal occupant out, and occasioned the injury. A wound incurred in such a school-boyish pastime may not be so honorable, as if it were received from a grape-shot, on the field of battle; but it is much better for mankind, especially for his own subjects. I highly approve of the publication of such occurrences, as they let us into the character and manners of the times; and I rejoice that his majesty's nose was in a fair way of recovery, when the last intelligence left the European continent.

Our readers will see that by the new act regulating commercial intercourse between this province and the United States, the duties on the importation of manufactures and provisions from the states are considerably reduced on most of the enumerated articles, although on nails, snuff, manufactured tobacco, and spirits, it is raised. The *advantorem* duty is reduced from ten to five per cent. This reduction is founded on good policy. Those duties are paid, eventually by the consumers, on this side, and not by the producers, on the other side. Besides, it is a fact, proved by all experience, and easily accounted for, that heavy duties, and rigor or intricacy in the revenue laws of any country, tends to promote smuggling; for which the facilities are great, and the temptation is strong, in this country. The most effectual antidote for these evils is moderation in the imposts, and uniformity and liberality of proceedings in the custom house. Any unnecessary severity, either in the laws, or the administration of them, would be as impolitic, as vexatious and discouraging to commerce. Our true interest is promoted by a free and friendly intercourse with our neighbors.

A considerable number of emigrants, a large proportion of them from Ireland, have, in the course of the present season, arrived in this town from Lower Canada, and have proceeded to various places of employment and settlement in the province.

We observe that a society has lately been formed at Quebec, under the title of the *Quebec Emigrant's Society*, of which his grace the Duke of Richmond is President, for the purpose of affording to those poor people relief and advice, upon their arrival at that place. The rules and regulations of the Quebec Emigrant's Society are nearly a transcript of those adopted by the Kingston Compassionate Society.

A public dispensary is about to be established in the city of Montreal, for the purpose of affording medical assistance to the poor and strangers gratis.

**Illustrious Travellers.**—The Duke of Richmond, the Earl of Dalhousie, and Sir Peregrine Maitland, have been travelling, this season, through the British provinces. At the same time, President Monroe has been taking a tour through the southern parts of the United States.

**Harvest.**—This is the most interesting period of the year to husbandmen. We hope they are securing a plentiful harvest, in all parts of the country, and most heartily wish them success.

Foreign News.

Extraordinary Legacy.

A very singular case is now depending before the Court of Sessions in Scotland, respecting a legacy to the amount of upwards of 50,000*l.*, bequeathed by the late Earl of F., (who died at Berlin,) to a foreigner who was one of his domestic servants. The payment of the legacy is disputed by the heir at law of the late Earl, on the ground that it was given for a highly immoral consideration; and from its novelty the case is, of course, the subject of much conversation in the northern metropolis. The arguments and pleadings in this extraordinary suit, in which the most eminent counsel of the Edinburgh bar are engaged, display much classical as well as legal learning; but no judgment has yet been pronounced by the court. From the magnitude of the sum in dispute, it will probably be finally determined by an appeal to the house of lords.—*London paper.*

A very important discovery has lately been made by the Dr. Cartwright, so well known for his mechanical attainments, which promises to be of infinite use and application. It is no less than a method by which a man may be enabled to enter into fair competition with the horse, in any way in which the power of that animal can be employed, with the exception of carrying a load upon the back. The soundness of the principle has been completely ascertained by an application of it to the impelling a four wheeled carriage, and drawing a plough.

About half past ten o'clock on Saturday night last, the whole of the gas lights at Leeds were suddenly extinguished, in consequence of a mistake by one of the persons at the gas house. Amongst the ludicrous circumstances to which the instantaneous darkness gave rise, was the consternation of a barber, who lost sight of his customer when his face was half shaved.

The following is given as the apportionment of the Waterloo prize money, granted by parliament:—To the duke of Wellington, commander in chief, 60,000*l.*; to each general officer, one thousand two hundred and fifty pounds; to each field officer, four hundred and twenty pounds; to each captain, 300*l.*; to each subaltern, 33*l.*; to each sergeant 19*l.*; and to each rank and file, two pounds ten shillings.

The tomb of marshal Massena is nearly finished; fifty horses were employed for some time in drawing marble for its construction. The eastern side of the tomb will bear this inscription—(sufficient for the hero) *Massena died the 4th April, 1817.*

**Important from Cadiz.**  
The editor of the N. Y. Gazette informs us that he had seen a letter from Cadiz, of the 19th June. It is from a Spanish officer in the army, to his relation in this city. This letter states a report here that an expedition of twenty thousand men were going to Buenos Ayres, but that only thirteen or fourteen thousand are visible. He observes that the reports about the Floridas are various—some, that there will be war with America. The writer the day before, June 18th, dined in company with his excellency, where were English, French, and Dutch naval officers. The writer observes, that he gathered enough to convince him that things were not going on well; that the departure of Don Onis from the U. States has some meaning in it.

**IMPORTANT FROM SOUTH AMERICA.**  
Extract of a letter from a highly respectable gentleman, dated St Thomas, July 3  
"I hasten to apprise you that we have this day received information from Augustura, of an action fought on the twelfth ultimo, at Curiana, by a division of the Spanish army under the command of General Arana, and a division of patriots led by Marino, in which the royalists were totally defeated, with a loss of from 1000 to 1100 men, all their camp equipage, documents, &c. The patriots, I regret to add, suffered severely, having lost 400 men."
