Mr. Thomas H. Wentworth,
OF Oswego, has taken a perspective view of the
FALLS OF NIAGARA,
from eight different positions, viz: One from near a Mr. Skinner's, which gives a full idea of all the river to be seen above and below the Falls, with the intermediate scenery of rapids, the establishment by Mr. Street, of Mills, &c. together with the residence of the Hon. Thomas Clarke.—One other view from the upper bank near Mrs. Wilson's, (so called) which is from a position near and immediately opposite the Falls: and showing as true a form of the horse-shoe, (so named) perhaps, as can be from any other position.

One View from the Table Rock, which gives a very full and the most perfect view of the entire sheets of water of the British and American Falls, that any position possesses. This also embraces the establishment of Mr. Street, Clarke, &c.

One other view, from opposite the American ladder, which presents a just idea of the American and British falls, introduces the establishment of Mr. Street's Mills, Mr. Clarke's, &c. giving, at the same time, in perspective, the American Channel, the settlement of Judge Porter, on the American side, the interspersed islands and a distinct view of Porter's Bridge to Goat or the Great-Island, which separates the two great sheets of water.

One view from the American Ladder, which from its situation presents a more just idea of the height of the waterfall, (while it introduces to view the two sheets of water) than any other position, perhaps, from which they can be taken.

One other view from the top of the American Bank, which gives the true line and formation of the American Fall, the division between that and the British, and a distinct view of the latter from the east.

Also, one other view from Goat-Island; this, from its situation, can only introduce the British, or great fall of water: it however, represents the scenery and great fall with fine effect.

Devoting some time in October, November and December last, in perfecting the delineation and true perspective of these views, Mr. Wentworth was flattered by the remarks of the Hon. Thomas Clarke, resident near the Falls, and by many other gentlemen in that vicinity, "that of the many views they had seen attempted, these were the most perfect," he received from the hon. Thomas Clarke, Mr. Street, Maj. Leonard, (near the falls) Thomas Dixon, and J. Kerby, Esquires, the Mr. Hamiltons, Sycord, Biggar, and sundry gentlemen of Queenston, the Hon. Wm. Dixon, J. Symnington, Esq. and many gentlemen of Niagara, their certified opinion of the correct representation which these views afford, and recommending them to those unacquainted with the scenery.

The gentlemen above enumerated, together with many others, have confirmed their opinion of the correctness of these delineations, by becoming subscribers for one or more copies each: and to render it more in his power to do justice to the liberal patronage he has already received, Mr. Wentworth purposes before he completes the paintings subscribed for, to devote two months in the city of New-York, for improvement in that part of the art of painting in which he is deficient, and flatters himself that the delay occasioned thereby, will be amply made up to his patrons, in the excellency of the paintings, and the effect which his Views of the Falls will produce.
