Foreign News.

New York, Aug. 7.

FROM EUROPE. The ship Remittance, captain Holmes, arrived yesterday afternoon in 48 days from Liverpool, having sailed on the evening of the 17th June.

The cash payment bill has passed the house of commons.

Liverpool, June 15. The importation of grain continues moderate. Little attention in wheat or barley; oats 1d and beans 1s a 3s lower; no alteration in peas, flour or oatmeal.

Butter in request English wheat, per 70lb 10s 6d a 11s; American do. do. 7s 6d a 9s 4d. American sweet flour per 196lb. 30s a 37; American sour do. 26 a 32s.

Liverpool Markets, June 17. Cotton, upland, 11d a 12d; New Orleans, 11d a 15d; 2s 2d a 2s 6d—Tobacco, 3d a 7d—Rice, 19s a 20s. Flour, American, 48s; do. sour, 28—Ashes, Pot, 38s a 40; Pearl, 43s a 46s—Tar, 13s a 15s—Turpentine, 10s 6d a 12s 6d.

Cotton had declined 1-4 per lb.

The royal assent was given by commission in the house of lords on the 14th June, to the American convention bill. The commissioners were the lord chancellor, the marquis of Winchester and the earl of Shaftsbury.

Petitions from all quarters were pouring in against the former amendment bill. The chancellor, Chequer, in bringing forward his bill of amendments means for the support of the nation, proposed an additional duty on malt which, Mr. Cawert, a member of the house, gives as his opinion, should it prevail, would run in nine tenths of the maltsters in the country.

Orator Hunt has been prosecuted for his proportion of the expenses attending the late Westminster election, and a verdict obtained against him.

London, June 15. In the house of commons on Monday, the cash payment bill was read a third time and passed, almost without a word being said upon its general tendency.

Mr. Ellice proposed a clause, which was adopted: giving to the bank the option of paying their notes either in bullion or gold coin, after the first of May, 1821, instead of being restricted, as it otherwise would have been, from making any payments in specie till 1823.

Mr. Manning also proposed an additional clause to the bill, specifying the precise period and the amount of the installments to be paid to the bank, in liquidation of the debt due by the government; but it was subsequently withdrawn, upon the assurance of the chancellor of the exchequer, that all the objects which it aimed to secure, would be more regularly provided for in a clause of the appropriation act.

The average price of wheat from the returns received in the week ended 5th June, is 68s 8d per quarter.

Mr. Bagot and suite landed at Portsmouth on Thursday from the Forth frigate, under appropriate salutes, and immediately set out for London.
