The custom is similar to an old English The custom is similar to an old English one, still prevailing in New England, and some parts of this province, called riding SKIMMINGTON, from the name of the place where it is supposed to have originated; with this difference, that the objects of a Charivari are some newly married couple, accused of what the mob are pleased to think an unseasonable or incongruous think an unseasonable or incongruous match; whereas the Skimmington discipline is applied to a married person of ei-ther sex, guilty or suspected of misbehav iour towards a husband or wife.
