## THE SECRET DISCOVERED.

Sir,

The War which convulsed Europe for a quarter of a century, and terminated in the imprisonment of Buonaparte in the Island of St. Helena, was perhaps the most extraordinary of any that has marked the Annals of mankind.

And among the various phenomena which its progress exhibited, none arrests the attention more forcibly, than the suddenness with which Countries were overrun, Kingdoms overturned, and Empires shaken to their base.

While the Mania of what were then called French principles, operated upon that vast and mercenary population, precipitating them into self-devoted sacrifices, upon what they considered the altar of liberty, the success of the French armies was not so much to be wondered at.

But when to the astonishment of surrounding nations, that very people who had reduced every thing into the chaos of Anarchy, professedly for the extinction of Royalty, had now of their own accord, set up a military despotism in its stead!—when those very hands yet red with the blood of Louis, had set the Crown upon the head of Napoleon, and when those very voices which made the air resound with the cry of "Long live the Majesty of the People," now vociferated as loudly "Long live the Emperor!" It may well be expected that these mighty effects would cease, as the cause which produced them no longer existed, having been destroyed by its own excess.

But did this prove to be the fact? Did the fortune that attended the standards of the Revolution, depart from the Eagles of Buonaparte? were the victories of the Empire less splendid than those of the republic?—by no means!—The effects instead of ceasing or becoming less, were increased, the stream of victory became a torrent of conquest.—Princes—Statesmen—Warriors, all stood aghast!—Princes saw themselves obliged to submit to the man who once would not have been allowed into their retinue! The oldest Statesmen not only saw their best laid plans frustrated, but they beheld the most ancient political foundations, matured by ages, disappear as in a moment, before what they considered as an Ephemeral produced in an hour of consternation!

But the most wonderful of all, and what laid the foundation of the other results—was what Warriors beheld with amazement—The most veteran armies, composed of the best disciplined soldiers, whose nerve and courage were not to be surpassed, by any that either continent could produce, and commanded by Generals who were supposed to have arrived at the climax of Military skill.—Yet these Armies—this Discipline,—those Generals, which had formed barriers for Kingdoms, and staple foundations for Thrones, were vanquished as if by magic; their defeat, dispersion, or destruction, seemed to be but the work of a day, until the foot of France stepped upon the neck of the prostrate Continent, and it seemed as if its ruler was destined to take up literally, the words of the Hero of Antiquity. "I came, I saw, I conquered!" and that no bounds were to be set to his ambition, but WALLS OF WATER, AND BATTERIES OF BRITISH OAK.

Soldiers who would rather die than yield, were defeated in a way they could not understand; and all the talents and efforts of their commanders, were rendered abortive by some secret management they did not comprehend; and it is said "The Secret" was never fully discovered until the mighty conflict had arrived nearly at its termination.

It may now be naturally enquired What was that secret?

It is answered—The Secret consisted partly in the mode of discipline Buonaparte adopted, partly in what was Peculiar in the construction of his armies; but chiefly in his plan and mode of attack.

With respect to discipline his tactics were not entirely ancient, nor perfectly modern; but like the English language, he drew from every source, made himself acquainted with the ancient Phalanx, as well as the modern Battalion; and neglected nothing that in his opinion, could perfect his system, or give him a new manoeuvre with which his adversary was not familiar. Accordingly we find him adopting something out of the common way in almost every battle.

With respect to what was peculiar in the construction and composition of his armies.—They were formed not only unusual into companies, regiments, brigades, and divisions, but also into grand divisions, each grand division, when complete consisted of twenty thousand men, and to each was attached a Corps de Elite, composed of two thousand sharp shooters or marksmen, so trained as to be sure of their object at an ordinary distance.—Eight grand divisions made a grand army which of course afforded sixteen thousand Sharp Shooters.—Besides these he had corps of Cuirassiers or Heavy Horse soldiers clad in armour—brigades of flying or Horse Artillery, and battalions of picked men called Imperial Guards, some of whom he styled Invincibles,—and with the combined efforts of these various descriptions of force, he carried into effect his plan and mode of attack.—Here lay his chief strength, and by this principally he overcame all the Continental Armies that were brought against him.

As soon as the hostile armies came in contact, his first business was to select the spot, at which he wished to make his attack and break the enemy's line, thither he drew the sharp shooters of his whole army, these came close and took their aim with such exactness, as generally to bring down the whole of that part of the enemy's line that was opposed to them, when this was done so repeatedly as to produce a slackness in the bringing up of reserves, to fill up the vacancy thus occasioned, or when he observed any hesitation or dismay in the enemy's troops, whose lot it was to occupy the ground thus become so fatal, he seized the portentous moment! immediately pressed on his columns of Guards, Cuirassiers, Horse or Flying Artillery,—here he broke through the enemy's line, poured his forces on their flanks and rear, at the same charging with his whole line in front.—The vicious impetuosity of the french national character, suited so exactly to this sudden and simultaneous attack the effect was like an electrical shock! penetrated and assailed at the same instant in every quarter.—Consternation! confusion! dismay! and rout! usually became the fate of the opposing army, and sometimes ended in their entire destruction!

Here then is "The secret discovered" that secured to Buonaparte those victories which made his name so dreadful in every place on which he could set his foot. Nor does it appear that his attack was ever completely unsuccessful until it was brought into exercise against the three-fold brothers of Britain whose unbroken front have equally refused to give way,—whether pressed by the Lilly, the Tri-coloured Fla., or the Imperial Eagle.

The Rose and Thistle, entwined by the fraternal embrace of the Shamrock—proved to mankind, that neither the troops nor genius of Buonaparte were invincible—the Nations were aroused from the stupor of despair.—"The secret was discovered" and the mighty drama passed away "like the baseless fabric of a vision!"

And now sir, as war is an evil to be deprecated, and as I am one whose wish, and proper avocation is peace, permit me in my FUTURE COMMUNICATION, to direct your attention to the development of another secret, at present more interesting and important to every friend of liberty and good order in this country.
