Mr. Editor.—Please insert in your next paper the following Report of the Fredericksburg Union Sabbath School.

When this School was proposed, many persons were unacquainted with its design; but became favourable to it, upon an explanation being given. A few were decidedly opposed to it. The greatest harmony and unanimity, however, prevailed in the School, and among its supporters, for the first six months, until a difference of opinion arose respecting the most suitable time of day for holding the School. That occasioned some dispute, and a number of parents withdrew their support, and their children discontinued their attendance. The others continued zealous and firmly united. The number of scholars at first was only twenty; it is now thirty, and at one time was nearly sixty. Six of the children are just beginning to read. There are six teachers. Twenty-four thousand six hundred and fifty-four verses have been committed to memory, and repeated from the New Testament.

Before the school commenced, boys were seen playing at ball on the sabbath; but afterwards no such practice was observed in this part of the Township. The scholars are attentive, and obedient to their instructors. Some of them are serious, and a few, professors of religion.

Four similar Schools were connected with this during the winter; but have been discontinued through the summer. We hope that neither the indifference of parents, nor any reluctance on the part of children will prevent a renewal of their exertions to obtain the best of all knowledge, the knowledge of the sacred scriptures and the christian religion.

Even those who look no further than this world, should nevertheless encourage Sabbath Schools, for the moral effect they tend to produce upon the state of civil society. In those places where they were not introduced, children and youth are seen spending the Lord's Day in fishing and fowling, or in lounging idleness. Experience has proved the utility of Sabbath Schools in improving the manners and morals of people, in all the common situations of life.

And when viewed among the means of imbibing young minds with an early knowledge of the Scriptures, and the principles of our holy religion, they appear still more important and worthy of support.

CONSTITUTION & REGULATIONS OF THE MORAL & BENEVOLENT SOCIETY OF

WE, the undersigned, deeply sensible of the obligations we are under to God, and to our fellow men, to endeavour to suppress vice, promote virtue, and "to do good to all as we have opportunity," do solemnly associate ourselves according to the following articles, viz:—

I. There shall be chosen, annually, in this Society, a President, Vice-President, Clerk and Treasurer. It shall be the duty of the President, and in his absence that of the Vice-President, to preside and preserve order in the meetings of the Society; the Clerk shall record the proceedings, and the Treasurer shall take charge of the property of the Society. There shall also be chosen, at the same time, a Committee of five or more suitable persons, who shall conduct, at their own discretion, the affairs of the Society and report their proceedings at each stated meeting.

II. We severally promise to abstain from whatever is forbidden by the laws of God, to keep for our guide the Holy Scriptures, endeavoring to do to all our fellow-men, as we would wish them to do unto us; and should a difference of opinion arise respecting what is forbidden, the question shall be referred to the standing Committee.

III. That we may ever be furnished with the means of instructing the ignorant, and extending relief to the destitute and distressed, we promise to pay to the treasurer, one dollar annually, to be expended as the society shall direct; and larger sums will be thankfully accepted from the rich, and placed at the disposal of the donors. But should there be any person of good moral character, destitute of property, who may wish for admission to the Society he shall be admitted gratis, to all the privileges of the Society, excepting that of voting in the meetings.

IV. All persons of either sex from 15 years and upwards, possessing a good moral character, may be admitted to this Society, and should any members in good standing, who are about to remove out of the bounds of the Society, wish for testimonials respecting their moral character, such testimonials shall be given them, signed by the President, Secretary and two or more of the committee.

V. We promise to meet at 6 o'clock on the Wednesday preceding the full moon of each month, or at such times as may be agreed upon, to attend to such business as may be brought before the Society, and by neglecting to meet without a reasonable excuse we will forfeit and pay to the Treasurer, for the benefit of the funds, half a dollar.

VI. At each regular meeting of the Society, the following questions shall be asked by the President: What immoral conduct, or what case of distress has any member discovered since our last meeting; and can we do any thing to wards remedying that evil, or relieving that case of distress? And provided the time agreed upon, shall be dismissed at each meeting. But no question relating to the peculiarities of religion or politics shall be brought into the Society.

VII. Should any member of this society be found guilty of immoral conduct, he shall be dealt with according to the rule laid down by our Divine Lord in the eighteenth chapter of Matthew.

The above Constitution of a Moral and Benevolent Society is humbly suggested for adoption in every place where such an institution is wanting. It may be altered or amended, as the circumstances of any place may require. And when it is known what valuable effects have been produced by such Societies, it is believed, that no place will be long destitute of one. Should any plead the want of money as an excuse for not joining such a Society, articles of produce will be taken instead of cash.
