THE YORK RIOT.

The native Canadians are certainly under many obligations to the patriotic Editor of the Chronicle, for his laudable endeavours to perpetuate the religious, moral, and political purity of Upper Canada.

The Chronicle states, in a very pathetic manner we must confess, what he conceives to be "the mitigatory circumstances" of the case before us, and recommends the spilling of "life's blood to rescue a father, a mother, or a sister from obloquy, from unmerited detraction"—but he would not wish "to be understood as holding out encouragement to duelling."

The Chronicle writer asks, whether "a man who kills another in self defence is tried for murder"; and whether, "when a man has been assaulted by another, and beats him in return for such assault, he is not justified in doing so?"

Our remarks are not dictated by feelings of hostility towards any of the individuals who are said to have been concerned in the riot, nor, as the Chronicle falsely insinuates, are we governed by "party feeling."
