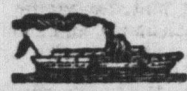

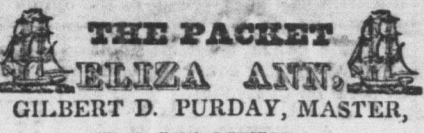

The Bridge intended to be built, is to be thirty feet in width, with a Draw Bridge, and a foot path of eight feet in the centre, protected by posts and rails, with a Toll House and gates, either on, or at one extremity, and the lowest part of the flooring to be six feet above the high water line. The Bridge is to be supported on wooden piers, (and not to be covered,) and of sufficient strength to allow of the transport of artillery; and as stability, durability, and economy, are primary objects, ornament is not to be taken in consideration.

A plan and specification of the intended Bridge is to be seen at this Office; but should any Plan or Model be given in by those willing to contract with an estimate of the expense which may be approved of by the Board of Directors, such plan may be adopted by them, if thought necessary.
