"Sir John Wyld, Chief Justice of the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope left town on Wednesday for Portsmouth, having in charge the Royal Charter for establishing a new Supreme Court in that Colony. Sir John Wyld embarked on Wednesday afternoon in the Downs, on board an East Indiaman, La Belle Alliance, Captain Hunter. The Puisne Judges have all left this country, and are out their voyage to the colony."


