An Extract from the Regulations of Upper Canada College.
THE College Quarters are ordered as follows.
First Quarter begins immediately after the Christmas vacation, about the 4th of January, and ends on the 20th of March.
Second Quarter begins on the 20th March, and ends on the 10th June.
