DEATH BY LIGHTNING. The packet ship George Canning, on the 16th inst. when in lat 54 30, lon 42, was struck with lightning, the heel of the fore-topmast, from the lower cross trees was shivered to pieces, and the combings of the fore-mast torn up; splinters from the top-mast damaged the fore-top sail and fore-top gallant sail; all on board felt the shock more or less; those of the crew near the foremast were knocked down. The brig Caroline, arrived last evening from Ponce, was struck by lightning on the 10th instant—it descended the main-mast, through the deck, and passed off by the fore-chains; it broke a plank, it caused the vessel to leak considerably. The mate and two men on deck at the time, were knocked down—the shock was so heavy that they thought the brig had struck on something.

HELP TO NEATNESS. An ox's gall will set any color—silk, cotton, or woolen. I have seen the colors of calico, which faded at one washing, fixed by it. Where one lives near a slaughter-house, it is worth while to buy cheap, fading goods, and set them in this way. The gall can be bought for a few cents. Get out all the liquid and cork it up in a phial. One large spoonful of this in a gallon of warm water is sufficient. It is likewise excellent for taking out spots from bombazine, &c. After being washed in this, they look about as well as when new. It must be thoroughly stirred into the water, and not put upon the cloth. It is used without soap. After being washed in this, cloth which you want to clean should be washed in warm suds, without using soap.
