

...her husband, to such use and as with her husband shall seem meet; provided always nevertheless, that such Deed shall not be valid or have any effect unless such married woman shall execute the same in presence of one of the Judges of the Court of King's Bench in this Province, or in the presence of a Judge in the District Court, or of a Judge of the Surrogate Court of the District in which such married woman shall reside, or of two Justices of the Peace for such District, and unless such Judge or two Justices of the Peace (as the case may be) shall examine such married woman, apart from her husband, respecting her free and voluntary consent to alien and depart with her Estate as mentioned in the Deed, and shall on the day of the execution of such Deed, certify on the back of the Deed in some form of words the effect following: "That on the day mentioned in the Certificate, such married Woman did appear before him, or them, (as the case may be) at the place to be named in the said Certificate, and being examined in the manner, and as the case may be) apart from her husband, did appear to give her consent to depart with her Estate in the Deed mentioned, freely and voluntarily, and without any coercion, or fear of coercion, or the part of her husband or of any other person, persons whatsoever."
