On an average, the quantity of Canadian Hemp which can be purchased at Kingston by the respective Officers, will be from Six hundred to Seven hundred Tons Annually. The price which can be paid for the same, will be according to its quality. Forty or Forty-three pounds Halifax Currency per Ton.

Colonel Covert has erected Mills near Cobourg, for the purpose of preparing Hemp for Exportation, and will give any information to Farmers respecting the best method of dressing it, and the profit likely to be obtained from cultivating Hemp in Upper Canada.
