**QUEBEC REGATTA.**  
The Regatta commenced on Monday at Quebec, and formed an excellent conclusion to the racing sports of the previous week. The Mercury, in the following paragraph, gives a lively description of the sailing and rowing matches of Monday. The two boats from New York, as might have been expected, carried all before them, and their reputations which the Whitehall boatmen have required for themselves is manifestly owing to the superiority of their craft, and great judgment was manifested by the Officers of the 32d and 71st Regiments in ordering their row-boats from New York. From the description given of them, we did not see the two boats, when here on their way to Quebec; they must be very superior. The Eagle, the four oared gig, is twenty-eight feet long, four feet wide, and built entirely of Stouich Canada; she is described as a beautiful model, of very light construction, and finished in a style of elegance that would lead one almost to imagine it had been taken from its place in a glass case, where it might have stood as a table ornament, merely to prove its excellence in its native element. The thwarts are narrow and thin cedar boards, only of sufficient strength to bear the oarsmen, and the ornaments, which consist only of a brazen eagle at the bow and a figure head at the stern, the cockswain's seat, are very plain, but handsome and appropriate. This elegant craft is said to weigh only 130 lbs.—[Mon. Gaz.] Yesterday these aquatic sports commenced, and, considering that amusements of this description, particularly in tide waters, depend on so many contingencies, it may be considered to have proved propitious to the occasion; a short deluge, occasioned by the wind and tide both setting down the River, being the only interruption experienced.

It should have been stated that the Officers who rowed in the six oared and four oared matches, laboured under the disadvantage of having been in field day on the Plains of Abraham from four to eight in the morning, during which they were wet to the skin and, of course, somewhat fatigued by being four hours under arms manœuvring on wet ground. The American boat Eagle was rowed with oars of greater length than those sent from New York with her. The day was remarkably fine, with wind enough to give interest to the sailing matches, yet not so much as to interrupt the rowing matches. The steamer John Nelson, with the band of the 71st Regiment, and Richelieu, with that of the 24th Regiment, took on board passengers, and cruised about during the day, affording a good view of the scene to the numerous spectators embarked on them—the basin was crowded with sailing and row boats, and the whole presented a most animated scene. The boat races were over before five o'clock, and terminated, we believe, without any accident.
