

ENGLISH MISCELLANY.

POLICE-MARLBOROUGH STREET. A young man of singular manners and appearance, who gave his name Charles Pugh, was charged before Mr. Conant, on Saturday, charged with lurking about the mansion of Earl Grosvenor.

THE value of Canadian Hemp per Ton, will be always regulated by the price paid for St. Petersburg or Riga Hemp, in the King's Dock Yards at home. On an average, the quantity of Canadian Hemp, which can be purchased at Kingston by the respective Officers, will be from Six hundred to Seven hundred Tons Annually. The price which can this year be paid for clean Canadian Hemp, as above described, will be according to its quality, Forty or Forty-three pounds Halifax Currency per Ton.

Colonel Covert has erected Mills near Cobourg, for the purpose of preparing Hemp for Exportation, and will give any information to Farmers respecting the best method of dressing it, and the profit likely to be obtained from cultivating Hemp in Upper Canada.

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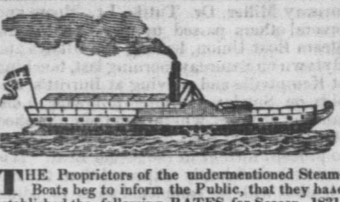
