Our New York papers received by the last mail furnish no later dates from England.

His Majesty's answer to the Address from the Corporation of Dublin, presented at the Levee, Feb. 22, 1832.

THE parents and guardians of deaf and dumb children, of the age of ten years or upwards, who may wish to avail themselves of the provision made by the Legislature for the board of a certain number of indigent deaf-mutes, are requested to send in, as soon as possible, to the Commissioners entrusted with the management of the fund, their applications, supported by satisfactory evidence that they are not the means of paying for the board of the child, at a rate not exceeding twenty-two pounds ten shillings a year, and that the children are intelligent and free from any disease or vice that might render their admission into the school objectionable. Those who are unable to pay the whole could afford to pay any part of the above sum, will make a declaration to that effect, and specify to what part of it they would undertake to pay. The school being open, and instruction given gratuitously, to all who may choose to attend, persons residing near the institution may send their children as day scholars, without incurring any expense. The age is not limited for day scholars, or boarders supported by their parents. The charge will be the same for all boarders.
