THE FRENCH WOMEN. "When a French lady comes into a room the first thing that strikes you is, that she walks better, has her head and feet better dressed—her clothes better fastened and better put on than any woman you ever seen before."

Her eyes sparkle with spirit—the most delightful salient dash from her fancy—in telling a story she is inimitable—the motions of her body, and the accents of her tongue, are equally genteel and easy—an exquisite flow of eloquence flows from her lips—she is only objects of her life are to please and to be pleased.

Her vivacity may sometimes approach to folly—but perhaps it is in her moments of folly that she is least interesting and agreeable. English women have many points of superiority over the French—the French are superior to them in many others. Here I shall only say, that in a particular idea, in which no woman in the world can compare with a French woman it is in the power of intellectual irritation.

ENGLISH WOMEN. "I have mentioned here the women of England, and I have done wrong. I did not intend to say that they were better than those of France."
