POLICE ACCOUNTS.

The Committee appointed to examine the Police accounts, beg to Report, that they have compared the several vouchers with the charges in the Treasurer's general statement, and find them to agree in every particular.

The amount expended during the year ending in May 1833, was £955 4s. 8d., while the receipts were only £204 3s. 7d, of which £43 were arrears due since 1831. The sum due the Bank of Upper Canada is £240, and the amount received from the Market fund is £241 1 1½.

while the receipts were only \$2.50 and the amount received how Market fund is \$2421 1 1\frac{1}{2}\$.

The Market Reserve account exhibits a balance in the hands of the Treasurer of £105 19 10\frac{1}{2}\$ applies to the services of 1833, and there remains to be paid by the Collector for 1832 a sum not less than £75. It will be observed that the Market-square rents, with the exception of £35, have been paid up to Sept. 1833.

The above sums, together with £40 15 2 paid to the Treasurer by the Clerk of the Market, will more than pay the Bank debt, leaving the whole of the assessment of 1833 at the disposal of the Magistrates.

By the Road Surveyor's account it appears that the sum of £268 13 10\frac{1}{2}\$ (including his salary of £50) was expended last year, the principal part being paid to Emigrants, for breaking stone and other labor performed on the roads. The balance in favor of the Surveyor is £1 16 11\frac{1}{2}\$. The amount received by the Clerk of the Market between the 7th May 1832 and the 15th May 1833 was £90 17 8, and the sum paid (including his salary of £40) £50 2 6, leaving a balance, for which he has obtained the Treasurer's receipt, of £40 15 2.


