ENGLISH SUMMARY.
COTTON DUTIES.—Lord Auckland, on Thursday, moved the order of the day for the House resolving itself into a Committee on the bill for reducing the duty on Cotton.

NEWSPAPER ADVERTISEMENTS.—Lord Althorp, on Monday, when the House went into Committee on the Stamp Duties Act, moved that a duty of 10s. be imposed on every newspaper advertisement.

SOAP DUTIES.—Mr. Leonard, last night asked whether those persons who had a stock of soap on hand would have any allowance made them in consequence of the withdrawal of the drawback.

IRISH SECRETARIES.—In reply to a question from Colonel Percival, last night, Lord Althorp stated, that great difficulty had been found in filling the vacant post of Irish Secretary.

SCOTCH UNIVERSITIES.—The Earl of Haddington on Tuesday inquired whether Ministers intended to set upon the report of the Board of Visitors, who in 1830 had collected four volumes of evidence touching the state of the Scotch Universities.

BANK AND EAST INDIA CHARTERS.—In reply to a question from Mr. Baring last night Lord Althorp stated that he intended to bring forward the Bank question towards the end of the next week.

GLASGOW LOTTERY BILL.—Sir Robert Peel, on Monday, in reference to the mode in which this bill had been smuggled through the House, recommended the appointment of a Committee to examine all bills that were introduced.

LINCOLN ELECTION.—The Committee reported on the same day, that Mr. E. L. Bulwer was duly elected.

SALISBURY ELECTION.—The Committee on Monday, reported that Mr. Wadhams Wyndham was not, and that the Hon. Capt. Bouverie was duly elected for this borough.

HARTFORD ELECTION.—Mr. Bernal moved on Monday, that the issue of the new writ for Hartford be postponed to Wednesday the 15th May.

MR. ELICE'S MOTION.—Mr. Ellice is busily engaged in investigating the means of reducing the expenditure of the Army. It is understood that the patronage system of keeping up so many skeleton regiments of Cavalry will be altered, and that permission will be granted to raise local troops in Canada.

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TRAVELLING TO & IN UPPER CANADA.
The new arrangements of the Upper Canada Line of Stages and Steam Boats has now been some weeks in operation and the additional convenience which is thereby afforded to the man of business and the traveller, is the theme of general remark.

THE QUEENSTON, which, as well as the Great Britain, is the property of the Hon. John Hamilton, Esq., is the only steamer on the navigation of Lake Ontario. Her arrangements have been announced in the Upper Canada papers as follows:—Leaves Prescott for Queenston every Tuesday afternoon.

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The United Kingdom, belonging to Robert Hamilton, Esq., has again commenced running this season, she is undergoing her late improvements. This fine vessel is we believe, the next in size to the Great Britain, and of 120 horse power, high pressure.

With gratitude, and pleasure, we weekly observe and record, many demonstrations of the growing wealth and prosperity of our Province; among these, we copy from the York Correspondent, the following account of the proceedings of a Special Meeting of the Canada Company in London, to which we beg to direct the attention of our readers.

On the 9th of May, a special meeting of the proprietors of shares in this company was held at Cannon House, in London, for the purpose of receiving a general statement of the affairs of the company; the Governor, Charles Bosanquet, Esq. in the chair. The Governor stated that pursuant to the resolution passed at the last meeting, the court had been summoned to have a statement of accounts laid before them, and despatches received from Canada with the accounts—Mr. Perry, the Secretary, then proceeded to read the reports. It stated that the total sales of land by the Company last year were 114,804 acres, of which 89,779 contained an average of 11s. 4d. per acre, and 25,025 in the Huron Tract, 7s. 6d. per acre.

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
