On Saturday evening last, Mr. Bethune received information relative to the robbery of the Cobourg Mail, which has fortunately led to a discovery of the person who committed it. Contrary to every suspicion which hitherto had clung to Cobourg and Belleville, this robbery was effected by William Ewing, the son of the Post-master at Belleville—a man who is lately started up between this place and Colborne. It appears that Ewing, a mere lad, was left in charge of the Post Office on the day that the Money Letter was forwarded from Cobourg to Kingston, and took advantage of the circumstance to abstract from the Mail the Kingston Bag, being careful to destroy the whole of it, except the Money Letter—According to the boy's own account, however, the Kingston Bag fell out, unobserved by him, while he was examining the general mail, and he did not discover it until after the mail was gone; that he was fearful of his father's anger, if he discovered his misdoings, and accordingly concealed the parcel to escape detection. This seems too improbable to be credited. He and another boy, a confederate of the name of Brown, are under examination (Tuesday) and will undoubtedly be immediately committed to the District gaol, money having been found in their possession.—Want of space prevents further notice.—[Cobourg Star.]

We are anxious to call the public attention to the design of Doctor Williamson, of Peterborough, to publish a small volume of ORIGINAL POEMS. This gentleman has been a long resident of this Province, and by his witty and poetical productions has obtained some celebrity in parts of Upper Canada, where he has resided. We have long entertained a favorable opinion of his talents, and are desirous to give every advantage to his publications, by a warm, but we believe, a just encomium can furnish him. It is the intention of Dr. Williamson, immediately to procure a sufficient number of names on his Subscription List, to publish a small, neat volume of Original Poetry, some of which is already favorably known in this Province, and has at different times been circulated through the public press. The volume will be accompanied by copious notes, and prefaced by a long and admirable preface, written in a very original style. The price of the volume to be \$1.

We do not advance our judgment in poetical matters as of critical worth; all that we pretend to is to understand the impressions made by poetry on our feelings, and to contribute their testimony in commendation of the correct taste and lively fancy which characterize many productions of the Doctor. His pretensions are of a popular nature, that we feel no hesitation in asserting his work will be a favorite, and is gladly welcomed by those whose taste leads to the perusal of works of the imagination. Dr. Williamson, as we have already mentioned, is not a mere adventurer in the wild and almost untried field of Canadian Literature, nor are his qualifications those of a mere straggler together of jingling rhymes. He possesses the fancy and feelings of a true poet, and has a felicitous and original mode of expressing himself that cannot fail to touch the heart and which is free from the stiffness and constraint that damp the feelings of the reader, and so often thrown a chill and a heartlessness over the first attempts of a poet. We refer our readers to the late numbers of the Star, where they will find several of his songs under the signature of Allan X. & Z. His "Spring" (No. 23.) is a very successful effort; the familiar voice of nature is felt in every line, while the language of the three first verses is most touchingly natural and descriptive. It is not to be expected that all is equally good; many of the pieces bear marks of hasty composition, and in their present state will not sustain the eye of close criticism; but a few finishing touches will enable the author to furnish a volume of original poetry, superior to any that has hitherto been published in this Province.—[B.]

We have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 28th ultimo, and in reply to acquaint you for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of Upper Canada, that on the 15th Feb'y, 1833, we represented to the Master General and Board of Ordnance, that it being highly desirable an adjustment of the several claims made by individuals for damages, according to the fourth clause of the Rideau Act which received the Royal Assent on the 17th February, 1827, should be come to with as little delay as convenient; and having at the same time proposed (with the approbation of His Lordship the Commander of the Forces) Lieut. Colonel Elliot, Brigadier Major at Quebec, as a proper person to be nominated the Arbitrator on the part of the Board of Ordnance, we may expect to be honoured with their commands by the May packet.

We assure His Excellency that no time shall be lost on our part to bring the above claims to a settlement, whenever we may be in possession of proper instructions on this subject, for our guidance.
